On Friday, June 18th beginning at 6:00 p.m., friends, family, community members, and consortium and other members from Cherokee Nation gathered together for the 9th Annual Kituwah Celebration. An estimated 20200 people attended this year and last year. Held annually, every June, the event is held to commemorate the Return of the Mother Town. In 1996, under Chief Dugan's leadership, Governor's Island or Kituhwa was purchased and returned to the tribe. Historians and elders refer to Kituhwa as

the place we come from...or the place where our first fire was built. Special thanks to everyone who joined us and to the Fire Department for their assistance each year. We also extend a special thanks to the Warriors of Anikituwah for their participation.

The town of Kituhwa according to James Mooney (199:15,182) was the nucleus of the Cherokee settlements when the Indians settled in the Southern Appalachians. The site was indicated on the Hunter map of 1730.

On June 19th, 2010 nearly 40 people gathered together for the 7 1/2 mile, Trail of Tears Walk. The event was started as a means to raise awareness about the Trail of Tears and to create the Ed Jackson Endowment Fund. The event was started by the Jackson family in Snowbird. Today, many people, including members of the Cherokee Nation travel annually to Robbinsville to participate in the walk. From young to old—everyone is honored to participate in such a wonderful event. Since 1987, when the Endowment was started, the Jackson family has raised and given out over 30,000 dollars in scholarships to students located in Snowbird.
