Ordinance No. 2	_(2020)

- WHEREAS, the Charter and Governing Document authorizes and empowers the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians (EBCI) Tribal Council to adopt laws and regulations for the general government of the Tribe. Charter and Governing Document, sect. 23 (Sept. 5, 1995) see also C.C. §117-10.
- WHEREAS, Tribal Council possesses the authority "to delegate its duties to committees formed from its membership..." C.C. § 117-10.
- WHEREAS, there is a need to combine the duties of the Community Services Committee and the Cherokee Police Commission, and;
- WHEREAS, replacing the Cherokee Police Commission with a new Law and Order Committee will save the EBCI approximately eight hundred forty thousand dollars (\$840,000) per year, and;
- WHEREAS, the general public would like more accountability for the EBCI's law enforcement departments.
- NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED in Council assembled at which a quorum is present that the Tribal Council amends Cherokee Code § 117-36 and rescinds Cherokee Code Ch. 120, as follows in EXHIBIT A.
- BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED the Ordinance provisions that amend or adopt new sections of the Cherokee Code shall be codified by the Department of Justice. The Department of Justice shall incorporate such amended provisions in the next codification of the Cherokee Code.
- BE IT STILL FURTHER ORDAINED should any provision of this Ordinance be determined invalid by the Cherokee Supreme Court, or the Cherokee Court without appeal to the Cherokee Supreme Court, or any other court of competent jurisdiction, those portions of this Ordinance which are not determined invalid shall remain the law of the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians
- BE IT FINALLY ORDAINED that the prior C.C. §117-36, C.C. Ch. 120, Resolution No. 36 (1954) and Resolution No. 29 (1987) and any other resolution or ordinance in conflict are rescinded and that this ordinance shall become effective when ratified

## **Cherokee Code**

## Chapter 117 - TRIBAL GOVERNMENT

## ARTICLE III. – BOARDS AND COMMITTEES

Sec. 117-36 - Community Services Committee Law and Order Committee.

- (a) The Community Services Committee shall be composed of eight members, which shall include the Principal Chief, Vice-Chief, and one Council member from each township. The six Council members shall be elected by the Tribal Council at each annual meeting of the Tribal Council held in October following the Tribal election, and shall hold office from the date of election until the following general election or until their successors shall be elected.
- (b) The Vice Chief shall serve as Chairman of the Committee and the Committee shall select a Vice Chairman from their membership. The Committee shall keep minutes of all meetings, which minutes shall be open to inspection at all times by members of the Tribal Council or officials of the Bureau of Indian Affairs.
- (c) No action shall be taken by the Committee without a quorum present, with a quorum constituting five members of the Committee. A majority of the members present at any meeting at which a quorum exists shall have authority to approve action in the name of the Committee. All expenditures of the Committee budget shall be approved by the Committee at a regularly scheduled meeting.
- (d) The budget as adopted by the Tribal Council shall be adhered to and no obligations shall be incurred in the name of the Tribe or the Committee contingent upon approval by the Tribal Council at some future session. The members of the Committee shall be financially responsible for any expenditures or obligations other than those in the budget.
- (e) The appointment of chief of police for the Cherokee Police Department shall be made in accordance with the usual hiring procedures currently used by the Tribe.

The chief of police will be responsible for planning and carrying out an adequate law and order program for the Cherokee Indian Reservation and shall report directly to the Principal Chief. The police chief shall have authority over the law and order program and, with the concurrence of the Principal Chief, shall select qualified persons for the positions of police officers. Any corrective action involving the police department shall follow the procedures outlined in the Tribe's personnel manual. The number of persons employed by the police department shall be determined by the funds available in the budget.

- (1) "Law Enforcement Officer" shall be defined to include officers of the Cherokee Indian Police Department, Natural Resource Enforcement officers and police service dogs.
- (f) The Committee shall conduct meetings at such regular times as the Committee may determine. The Chairman shall have authority to call meetings of the Committee at such other times as he or she deems necessary. A special meeting may be called at the request of any three members of the Committee by giving all members five days' written notice of the time, place and purpose of such special meeting. All Committee meetings called in accordance with these conditions shall be considered as regular meetings for purposes of action taken or directed by the Committee.
- (g) All prior resolutions concerning the Community Services Committee or which conflict with the provisions of this Section are hereby rescinded to the extent they are inconsistent with this Section including, but not limited to, Resolution No. 36 (1954) and Resolution No. 29 (1987) also codified at Section 117-9 in the Cherokee Code.
- a. The Tribal Council establishes the Law and Order Committee.
- b. The Law and Order Committee shall consist of six Tribal Council representatives, one from each township.

1	c.	The Committee shall exercise oversight authority including but not limited to
2		Cherokee Indian Police Department, Alcohol Law Enforcement, Natural
3	:	Resources Enforcement, and Department of Corrections:
4		1. To coordinate, oversee, and regulate the Eastern Band of Cherokee
5		Indians' (EBCI) the tribe's public safety services;
6		2. To improve the administration of EBCI's criminal justice by ensuring a
7		system that is free from political influence and that is accountable and
8		responsible to the EBCI.
9		3. To protect the rights and interest of the EBCI enrolled members by
10		improving the quality and effectiveness of the tribe's public safety
11		services.
12		4. To enhance the operations and coordination of all EBCI law enforcement
13	:	departments in order to increase the availability, quality, and effectiveness
14		of the EBCI public safety services.
15		5. To enable the EBCI to more effectively provide efficient public safety
16		services.
17		6. To support effective cooperation and coordination between EBCI law
18		enforcement agencies and that the various states and federal government
19		law enforcement agencies.
20		3. To recommend to the Tribal Council the adoption of resolutions or
21		ordinances designed to strengthen the Cherokee Code;
22	<u>d.</u>	Powers. The Committee shall have the following authority and powers necessary
23		and proper to carry to carry out the purpose set forth above:
24		1. To review and approve policy and procedures for all law enforcement
25		divisions, departments and programs under the Committee's oversight
26		authority and to amend or rescind such policy and procedures.
27		2. Review and approve all agreements negotiated by tribal law enforcement
28		with other federal, state, regional, and local governmental agencies,
29		subject to approval by Tribal Council.
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- 3. To review and make recommendation to the Tribal Council proposed amendments to and enactments in the Cherokee Code.
- 4. To review, amend, recommend and submit the annual budget for programs under the Committee's oversight to the Tribal Council.
- To review, recommend, and rescind current and additional Originating
  Router Identifier (ORI) for submission to the State.
- 5. To recommend to the Tribal Council the creation of any division or department intended to be under the Committee's oversight by adopting its policy and procedures; and to rescind that policy and procedures or existing policy and procedures for any division or department under the Committee's oversight.
- 6. To appoint the Cherokee Indian Police Department's Chief of Police. The appointment shall be made in accordance with the current Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians Personnel Policies and Procedures Art. 5, Selection. Appointment, and Separation. The chief of police shall be responsible for planning and carrying out an adequate law and order program for the Cherokee Indian Reservation and shall report directly to the Executive Committee. The police chief shall have authority over the law and order program and, with the concurrence of the Executive Committee, shall select qualified police officers. Any corrective action involving the police department shall follow the procedures outlined in the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians Personnel Policies and Procedures Articles 13 and 14. Corrective Action Procedure and Appeals. Prior to implementation, the Committee shall approve all personnel recommendations. The number of persons employed by the police department shall be determined by the approved annual budget submitted to Tribal Council.

10	This chapter shall incorporate a body to be known as the Cherokee Police Commission
11	(CPC) into the Cherokee Code, of which its initial membership was approved per Resolution No

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14	Sec. 120-2. Purpose.
15	The purpose of this chapter is to create an independent commission whose mission is to

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23	Sec. 120-6.	Effective Date.
