CPF grant to help finish Cherokee Children's Home

onstruction on the first building of the new Cherokee Children's Home is almost complete, and, thanks to a \$400,000 Cherokee Preservation Foundation grant, construction can continue on the second building.

The new Home is being built on 28 acres located on Goose Creek Road in the Birdtown Community. When completed, the new Home will consist of two cottages, each with nine beds and other amenities.

"The first building is pretty much complete," said Cris Weatherford, Cherokee Children's Home director. "We're pretty much just waiting on flooring, and then they'll hook up the outside AC units and then some site work outside which they've been waiting on the weather to do."

On the grant, he said, "This will be a \$200,000 construction grant to include many environmentally-friendly and energy-efficient building practices and a \$200,000 matching grant."

"The products we used, such as tankless hot water heaters that run on propane, spray-in foam insulation, LED lighting throughout the buildings,

and a propane-powered back-up generator would not have been possible to purchase without the Cherokee Foundation's support."

He added, "So far, the total cost of the project is estimated to be a little over \$2.6 million."

To date, the project has received funding from various sources including grants from the Cherokee Preservation Foundation and the HUD Indian Community Development Block Grant, a \$400,000 donation (\$80,000 a year for five years) from the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians and a \$100,000 donation from the Tribal Alcohol Beverage Control Commission. They have also just received a \$20,000 grant from RTCAR (Revitalization of Traditional Cherokee Artisan Resources) for outside landscaping and edible landscaping that will help teach the youth at the Home about edible plants.

Weatherford said the second house is a little more than 50 percent complete. "It's dried in and the insulation is in."

"It's expensive to build now," said Weatherford who comparatively said that the houses at the current Home were built in 1969-71 for around \$25,000 each. "This is not just going to be a regular stick home. We're using some of the best and latest practices out there, and a lot of that is made possible because of the Cherokee Preservation Foundation. What Western Builders is building today is a much more technologically-advanced building that should last for many decades. They are wonderful to work with and patient with our financial situation.

Weatherford said he is happy with the construction at the site to date. "I'm very pleased with how they're coming along. I think they're doing a great job over there. I'm super anxious to get over there and start using them."

The Cherokee Children's Home was established in 1969 and has been the permanent or temporary home for over 1,700 Cherokee youth over the years. Currently, the existing Home has six children.

"Our end result will be two homes for up to 18 children," said Weatherford. "This will be the type

of home that they have likely not lived in before. Our program will grow and create more opportunities for these children to learn what it takes to make a great Cherokee person. Hopefully, we can show them what a home can look like so when they are in a position to have a home and family, it will be functional and healthy."

He stressed the importance of the Home by saying, "These are the community's most vulnerable children, the ones that are in a the system now and the ones that are likely to continue that cycle unless we are there to show them something different."

Harrah's Cherokee Valley River's job fair attracts over 500

URPHY - Harrah's Cherokee Valley River Casino & Hotel hosted its first job fair for table games dealers and surveillance officers on Friday, March 20 at Tri-County Community College in Murphy. The event drew more than 500 people from the surrounding area. Nearly 180 attendees were offered positions as table games dealer trainees, and 45 were offered positions as surveillance officer trainees.

"We're very pleased with the turnout for our first job fair," Lumpy Lambert, Harrah's Cherokee Valley River Casino & Hotel general manager, said. "We will continue to host more job fairs in the region over the coming months in order to fill the 800 positions required before opening later this

year."

Table games dealer trainee positions are open to anyone who passes a math assessment and a panel interview. Candidates do not have to know how to deal black jack, craps or roulette at the time of hire. Table games dealers are responsible for dealing games and providing a courteous and entertaining experience for guests. Dealers are anticipated to earn \$30,000-\$50,000 annually, based on tips.

Upcoming job fairs will highlight table games dealers in addition to slot hosts, slot techs, facilities/maintenance, cashiering, hotel, and food and beverage.

f your spring cleaning turns up unwanted pesticide containers, bring them to the Pesticide Collection Day. The North Carolina Pesticide Disposal trailer will be set up for one day only offering free, safe pesticide disposal at the Acquoni Expo Center parking lot on April 14 from 10am - 2pm.

This program is offered by the North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. The EBCI Cooperative Extension Agriculture Program and the EBCI Sanitation Department work together to schedule this free service.

For the Pesticide Collection Day Event, pesticides must be clearly labeled in their original containers. Unknown products cannot be accepted. Staff will be on hand to remove the pesticide containers from your vehicle.

Pesticides are toxic. It is important to handle them carefully and avoid spills that could occur during transport. Do not carry pesticides in the passenger compartment of a vehicle. The vapors can be poisonous and make the driver and passengers ill. It is recommended that you transport the pesticides securely in the trunk of a car or in the bed of a pick-up truck. When transporting pesticides take extra care to secure and brace them so they do not shift or fall over.

Tribal member named NACF director of programs

ANCOUVER, Wash. - In a national search, the Native Arts and Cultures Foundation has selected Francene Blythe, an EBCI tribal member, to succeed as director of programs. Blythe resumes the position from predecessor Reuben Roqueni

(Yaqui/Mexican), who helped develop programs in the foundation's start-up years.

Blythe comes from a career in Washington, D.C., where she first developed and produced creative cultural arts programming at the Smithsonian Institute's National Museum of the American Indian public programs department working with Native peoples throughout the Western Hemisphere, including the First Americans Festival, which celebrated the opening of the museum. She then strategically directed the growth and expansion of the All Roads Film Project at the National Geographic Society where she built an award-winning portfolio of grant awards supporting Native and Indigenous filmmakers and photographers worldwide.

Her early career began working with Native communities throughout the Midwest in theater, school workshop presentations entitled, "Unlearning Indian Stereotypes," and presenting her master thesis in a Native American play entitled, "Evening at the Warbonnet" by playwright Bruce King (Oneida).

"We are pleased to bring on the talented Francene Blythe to lead our Programs department," said NACF President/CEO T. Lulani Arquette (Native Hawaiian). "Francene is a wonderful addition to our team and she will be instrumental in continuing existing work and also presenting new initiatives we've been working on to benefit individual artists, organizations and Native Nations."

Blythe is Navajo from her mother, and Sisseton-Wahpeton and Eastern Band Cherokee from her father.

Next phase of work on Newfound Gap Road begins in April

Great Smoky Mountains National Park officials announced that a project to repave 4.3 miles of Newfound Gap Road will begin on April 13. This work is part of a multi-phased rehabilitation project started in 2007. The section to be resurfaced extends from Sugarlands Visitor Center south to Chimney's Picnic Area where the last phase ended.

This section of road was last repaved in the 1980s and is badly deteriorated. In addition to the repaving, several drainage culverts will be replaced and two retaining walls will be constructed near the Carlos Campbell Overlook. The contractor will temporarily shift the road to the west by 2 to 3 feet to accommodate a drill rig used for setting the structural parts of the retaining wall near the pullout just north of the main Carlos Campbell Overlook. This lower pullout will be closed for approximately two months while the retaining wall is being constructed, but the main, upper overlook will remain open.

"The scenic drive along Newfound Gap Road is enjoyed by millions of people each year and we are pleased to have this opportunity to improve road conditions," said Superintendent Cassius Cash. "We have made every effort to minimize the inconvenience to park visitors traveling along the road to reach both park destinations and our gateway communities. The contract includes a variety of work restrictions selected to minimize lane closures during the busiest periods."

The work will be performed under a \$ 14.4 million contract with Estes Brothers Construction of Jonesville, VA and will be administered by the Federal Highway Administration's Eastern Federal Lands Highway Division. Funding is provided to the NPS through the Federal Lands Transportation Program to support this work. Motorists should expect delays due to lane closures through June 15. There will not be any daytime lane closures from June 15 through Aug. 15, but nighttime lane closures may occur throughout the project. After Aug. 15, daytime lane closures will again be allowed through Sept. 30. No work of any kind will be permitted on federal holidays or during the month of October. Daytime lane closures will resume from Nov. 1 - December 17.

SOCCER Cherokee falls to Swain 5-1, Ledford scores four

he Cherokee Lady Braves battled the Swain Lady Maroon Devils, and the lack of any substitutes, during a home match on Monday, March 23. Swain topped Cherokee 5-1 as the Lady Braves took the field with 11 players and no bench.

"It was tough today, it was really tough today," Gary Ledford, Lady Braves head coach, said after the game. "We faced a lot of adversity from the get-go, before we even stepped on the field, but the team played tough. They did not stop. They did not quit, and they just kept hammering through until the very end."

Ledford added, "We're running with zero subs right now. The team you see out there is the team we've got. Hopefully, next time we play Swain, later on in April, we'll be ready for them."

Storm Ledford, Swain senior forward and EBCI tribal member, scored four goals for the Lady Maroon Devils.

The first half was all Swain as Storm Ledford scored her first of the day on a shot from about 15 yards out that went into the middle of the left side of the net. A few minutes later, she intercepted a pass from the Cherokee goalie and knocked it in from about 5 yards out for her second goal of the day.

Just before halftime, Swain's Abigail Durisseau found some room on the right side of the field and drilled a shot from 15 yards out that sailed into the top right of the goal to make it 3-0 in favor of Swain at the half.

Cherokee came out in the second half and was able to move the ball around a little better. They also began to push the ball upfield more which led to a score of their own. Sidnie Yanez took a free kick for Cherokee following a Swain foul. She sent the ball near the goal, and players from both sides knocked the ball around a little when Cherokee's Samatha Rauch knocked it in for a goal for the Lady Braves to make it 3-1. Ledford would add two more goals in the last few minutes of the match including a 35-yard blast from about 35 yards out on a free kick.

soccer Lady Braves have tough road loss at Smoky Mountain

YLVA – The Cherokee Lady Braves had a tough road loss at Smoky Mountain on Thursday, March 26 in a rare night game. Smoky Mountain's Katie DeWeese and Taylor Douthit each got a hat-trick (three goals) as the Lady Mustangs took the win 9-0.

"It was a tough game," said Gary Ledford, Lady Braves head coach. "We went up against a good team tonight. They are disciplined, skilled, and deep. They have their starters back from last year, and they were a playoff team last year. We just don't have enough firepower, but you've got to give it to our team for sticking in there. We're working with zero subs - no bench whatsoever."

In the first half, Smoky Mountain had 15 shots with nine of those being on goal. Cherokee had two with both being on goal. The Lady Braves had three corner kicks to Smoky Mountain's six.

Both teams played nice defense in the first 10 minutes of the match. But then, Smoky Mountain began to open it up some and got some passing lanes established. DeWeese scored the first goal of the

match at 29:24. Six minutes later, Douthit scored her first following a corner kick at the 22:48 mark.

Douthit added another just two minutes later to make it 3-0 in favor of Smoky Mountain with just over 20 minutes left in the half.

Cherokee had its best chance of the half when Avery Guy went on a long 60-yard run by herself and drilled the ball towards the goal from about 10 yards out, but the ball hit the post and Smoky Mountain cleared it out.

Three minutes later, Douthit got her third of the match to make it 4-0 with 4:43 left in the half.

Then, less than a minute later, Kaitlyn Karcher scored the fifth goal of the half for Smoky Mountain following a corner kick. The Lady Braves trailed 5-0 at the half.

Smoky Mountain kept the pressure up in the second half and didn't allow Cherokee a single shot or corner kick. The Lady Mustangs took 13 shots including nine on goal and had three corners. Second half goals for Smoky Mountain included: Karcher (32:48), DeWeese (31:00), Heather Watson (18:58) and DeWeese (9:49).

"We're young at this," said Coach Ledford. "I intentionally scheduled some tough teams because you don't get better at soccer, or any sport, by playing teams that are weaker than you. We're good. We're getting stronger."

He praised his team's progress already this season and said that they are a completely different team than the one that started the season. "We look so much better, but we've got a lot of work to do. Give us a little bit of time, and I think we're going to surprise some people."

Johnson places third, Braves win at five-team match

VETERANS CORNER Corporal Henrietta Victoria Harlan

orporal Henrietta Victoria Harlan is a United States Marine Corps Veteran from the Painttown Community in Cherokee. She was a 2531 Field Radio Operator and served on active duty from Nov. 3, 1981 to Sept. 29, 1987. Her last duty command was the US Marine Corps Base 29 Palms, CA.

At the age of 24, Corporal Harlan completed basic training at Parris Island, SC and graduated as the Company Honor Grad. She was issued one of two first sets of Dress Blues issued to a female Marine. CHEROKEE HISTORY Old Fields - Ustigohi Stecoah

he town site of Ustigohi was located just a few miles from the Qualla Boundary in Whittier. Ustigohi is translated as "Little Place". Along with many of the Cherokee Middle Towns, Usdigohi was burned in 1761 as part of a British military expedition let by Colonel Archibald Grant. The British made a practice of burning Native American towns as punishment for "acts of aggression". The Grant Campaign against the Cherokees was carried out because of events that occurred during the French and Indian War, a subject that will be covered in a future article.

Ustigohi was burned twice in 1776 by North Carolina Militia forces. The fall campaign led by Griffith Rutherford saw standing crops, homes, and food stores destroyed in order to prevent Cherokees from fighting with the British as part of the American Revolution. The Ustigohi was razed again in early November by North Carolina troops led by Captain William Moore to ensure that the Cherokee Middle Towns were not rebuilt. On this second expedition, two Cherokee men were killed just outside of town along the banks of the Tuckasegee. The town was burned again in the 1780s by Tennessee forces under

the command of John Sevier.

When this part of the Cherokee Nation was annexed for white settlement under the Treaty of 1819, it was purchased by William Holland Thomas as his personal property. Now known as Stecoah Old Fields, a North Carolina Historic Sites Marker is located along US 74 between Cherokee and Whittier.

Sometime in the 1780s, after seeing their homes and crops burned

repeatedly, many members of this town moved west to a small, more remote valley in present day Graham County. The people of Ustigohi, or Stecoah, remained there until their removal on the Trail of Tears in 1838. Records show that there were 15 households there in 1838. Only one family remained in North Carolina after the Removal. The present day community of Stecoah is about 10 miles outside of Robbinsville.

With the turkey population at an all-time high across America, you have a pretty good chance of coming across a dominant gobbler traveling with hens, jakes, and subordinate gobblers. Even though it's next to impossible to call the boss away from the flock, it can be pretty easy to call the flock's subordinate gobblers into range.

Subordinates are usually 2-year-old birds that have gotten heat up by the boss a few times. Because they don't want to upset the boss again, they rarely gobble but do yelp and cluck to keep track of the flock.

Whenever you hear a gobbler doing this 30 to 40 yds, to one side of the flock, slip as close as you can and try to make the subordinate believe one of the boss's hens is calling him. He will usually come in pretty comfortable and confident with a smile on his face but won't risk gobbling because he's afraid the boss will find out. Keep your eyes open and be ready.
