FOR THE FUTURE Groundbreaking held for new Cherokee Children's Home

he Cherokee Children's Home was established in 1969 and has been the permanent or temporary home for over 1,700 Cherokee youth over the years. A groundbreaking ceremony was held on Tuesday, Nov. 27 on a new \$2.6 million facility.

The new home will be built on 28 acres located on Goose Creek Road in the Birdtown Community. It will consist of two cottages each with nine beds and other amenities. Two Cherokee ladies were at the forefront of the effort to have the new home built. Francine Watty and her aunt, Gunnie Bradley, approached Tribal Council several years ago and asked that funds be found for a new facility.

"We never wanted to step on anybody's toes," Watty told the crowd at Tuesday's event. "We just saw a need for these children. We thank you all for making that dream possible."

"I think it's wonderful and it's sad too that we have to put our children in the Children's Home, but that has to happen sometimes."

Bradley added, "I just thank each and every one of you

that's helped us with this project along the way. I just know that those children are so very important and one day they're going to be our leaders."

"Just having them in a safe, warm place is going to be good for them."

Principal Chief Michell Hicks said, "Sometimes we all just need a little bit of motivation, and I'm just proud that the last two projects have been all about the children."

"We have just had the opportunity to set a great stage for the future of our kids, and I think we're definitely taking the right steps."

Chief Hicks thanked Watty and Bradley for their vision as well as the efforts of the Cherokee Boys Club staff. He also commented, "I want to thank the Tribal Council for looking ahead and taking care of the future generations of our people. That's what it's all about."

The Cherokee Boys Club will do the actual construction.

Tommy Lambert, Cherokee Boys Club general manger, related that the new home will be built with funds from the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians, a grant from HUD, as well as monies from various fundraisers and contributors.

"We appreciate all of those donations," said Lambert. "Every little bit helps when you're trying to make a project like this come to life so we appreciate all of those efforts that people have put forth."

Lambert said the Boys Club acquired the site several years ago in anticipation of being able to use it for a project like the Children's Home.

"We're glad the project has come to pass and hopefully we'll have a beautiful home here for the kids in need."

Cris Weatherford, Cherokee Children's Home director, commented, "I can't explain what this is going to mean to me and what we do every day at the Children's Home with taking care of these kids."

He said it will mean the world for the kids to have an "up-to-date, safe, nice house" to live in.

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Suspects arrested in Preidt murder

Three people have been arrested and charged in connection with the murder of Barbara E. Preidt, 76, of Shelbyville, IN, that occurred at the Fairfield Inn & Suites in Cherokee on Sept. 30. The Cherokee Indian Police Department and the N.C. SBI obtained and served a search warrant for a residence at Olivet Church Road in Cherokee.

Three people were arrested on Thursday, Nov. 29 including: George Nobles, 36; Ashlyn Carothers, 20; and Dwayne Edward Swayney, 43; all three residing in Cherokee.

The search warrant and arrests came from CIPD investigators following up on leads from recent information.

Nobles is charged with North Carolina state charges including: 1st Degree Murder, Armed Robbery, Felon in Possession of a Firearm (two counts) and a pending charge of Manufacturing Marijuana. Carothers is charged with the following tribal charges: Aid and Abet Armed Robbery, Aid and Abet Homicide in First Degree, and a pending charge of Manufacturing Mari-

juana. Swayney is charged with a tribal charge of Tampering with Evidence.

"This investigation has been ongoing for nearly two months and our law enforcement officers and the

Preidt family have been very diligent in solving this case," said Cherokee Chief of Police Ben Reed. "Our officers have done an outstanding job and we are extremely encouraged by these arrests, many questions have been answered."

"But, there is a lot of work yet to be done to prepare for the prosecution of this case. This is a great example of law enforcement agencies and our community working together. I thank the Lord for what has been done and we will do our best to pray for the families of everyone involved."

Dispatchers received a call on

Sunday, Sept. 30 at around 9:58pm from a resident of shots being fired near Reuben Taylor Road, an area in close proximity to the Fairfield Inn & Suites. Responding CIPD officers found Preidt lying on the ground in front of the hotel, and witnesses stated that the suspect grabbed Mrs. Preidt's purse and as she struggled to hang on to the purse, the suspect fired the gun at close range fatally wounding Mrs. Preidt.

Rewards totaling \$25,000 were offered by the CIPD and Preit's family for information leading to the arrest and prosecution of the crimes.

TN man apprehended in alleged vehicle break-in in Park

Blount County Sheriff's Office deputies arrested a LaFollette, Tenn. man, Brian Ivey, age 38, who was suspected of breaking into a car parked at Chimney's Tops Trailhead inside the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. Rangers turned over pursuit of Ivey to Blount County Sheriff's Office after the suspect exited that Park.

On Sunday, Dec. 2, at about 10:50 a.m., while conducting a surveillance operation, a park ranger witnessed what he believed to be a break-in of a vehicle parked at Chimney Tops Trailhead on Newfound Gap Road. He observed a suspect leave the scene in a Ford pick-up truck. When rangers attempted to stop the vehicle on Little River Road, west of Sugarlands Visitor Center, the subject fled westbound. The subject continued to elude rangers and exited the park at the Townsend Wye. Once outside the park, rangers turned over the pursuit to Blount County Sheriff's Office deputies who eventually took the subject into custody when the pick-up truck crashed.

Townsend Police Department also provided assistance during the incident.

Rangers and special agents have confirmed the theft of property from a visitor's Ford Explorer parked at Chimney Tops Trailhead. The investigation of offenses occurring within the park continues and federal charges are anticipated.

Cherokee's clover lady

f you have seen a lady on the side of the road or in a field bending over looking at the ground, she isn't looking for her contacts. It is probably Arlene "Sarge" Samford, and she is searching for the ever-elusive four-leaf clover.

Samford, 81, started her quest for multi-leaf clovers six years ago and has, as of this week, collected 7,353 four-leafs; 545 five-leafs; 50 six-leafs; and three 7-leafs. She keeps them in mounted cases which currently fill 28 cardboard boxes.

"I've got certain patches that I look in," said Samford who related she searches all over Cherokee for them.

"My church (Cherokee Pentecostal Holiness Church) has a very productive four-leaf clover patch. Almost every time I go to church, I go to the patch. I have found as many as 40 or 45 there at a time."

Samford was raised on a farm in Illinois. "My dad had a ten-acre field, and we'd go out with him and he would come back with a whole pocket full of four-leaf clovers. We would come back with nothing. We just couldn't see them."

"So, six years ago I looked in my yard and said 'oh, I've got some four-leaf clovers.""

And, the search began. She found 300 that first year.

Samford said that her challenge to herself was to find 2,000 four-leaf clovers this year. She met that goal in a clover patch she searched on July 4 while visiting her sister in Illinois.

Her friends have been very supportive, and she said that Tsali Manor has been very interested in her project and some of her friends from there challenged her to up her number to finding 2,500 this year. "On Sept. 10, I found my 2,500th one."

"And, then they changed it to 3,000. Well, I have found 2,841 this year so I'm not making it to 3,000."

In 2011, she found her last clover on Dec. 23 and this year she found her first one at the Cherokee Post Office on Jan. 1. "Some people are really excited about my project," said Samford. "It's my exer-

cise program, and I've lost weight." In addition to

searching for clovers, Samford is an

avid beekeeper and is a member of the North Carolina State Beekeepers Association, Tennessee State Beekeepers Association, Alabama Beekeepers Association, Smoky Mountain Beekeepers, Eastern Apicultural Society, and the American Beekeepers Federation. She has been named Person of the Year by the North Carolina association.

Samford travels to beekeeping conventions and meetings all over the country and the world. So far, she has attended events in 16 states and four foreign countries including Canada, Austria, Switzerland and Belgium.

Most remember Samford as a nurse at Cherokee Indian Hospital where she retired from after 13 years at that facility, 33 years with Indian Health Service and 45 years of nursing in all. She worked on seven different American Indian reservations and prides herself as being the last nurse at Cherokee Indian Hospital to still wear the nurses' hat.

Samford definitely keeps busy, and her search for multi-leaf clovers continues with new goals.

"There's a fellow up in Alaska that has 160,000 four-leaf clovers in his collection. But, he's had a lot of people helping him."

Charles George honored at VA event

ASHEVILLE - Sixty years to the day, Pfc. Charles George was honored and remembered for an incredible act of bravery and heroism that saved two of his comrades and cost him his life. Pfc. George, an EBCI tribal member, threw himself on a grenade saving his buddies on Nov. 30, 1952 near Songnae-dong, Korea, an act that would earn him a posthumous Medal of Honor.

Friday's event, which featured members of the Steve Youngdeer American Legion Post 143, was held at the Charles George VA Medical Center in Asheville. The event was held as part of a day-long celebration of Native American Heritage Month at the Center.

"Pfc. Charles George's sacrifice is a model for all staff members and volunteers here who have the honor of serving veterans who come to our medical center and our clinics in Rutherfordton and Franklin," said Cynthia Prifogle, Charles George VA Medical Center director. "We are not combat soldiers like him, but if there is something that we can do to help improve the lives of our veterans and their families, we hope we will all be just as willing as Pfc. George to take necessary action. I am very proud to lead this Medical Center and Clinics that are named after Pfc. Charles George."

Post 143 Commander Lew Harding commented, "This courageous young soldier honored us all, and also we lift you up who serve us all in this medical capacity that we appreciate so very much."

Warren Dupree, Post 143 service officer, told the crowd that before deploying to Korea, Pfc. George stopped at the Cherokee Elementary

"At 20 years old, he was more than a new recruit volunteering for service in Korea, he was a warrior following the footsteps of his ancestors going into combat to protect his people."

erard Parker, former Tribal leader, passed away Saturday, Dec. 1. He served as Principal Chief of the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians, Vice Chief for six years and as a Painttown Representative for 16 years.

For more than twenty years, Parker served the Tribe on numerous committees including the Community Services Committee where he was instrumental in developing the programs of Emergency Management, Emergency Medical Services, and the Cherokee Fire and Police departments. He also worked to develop tribal infrastructure and the sanitation programs.

Parker served as Vice Chief when the tribe broke ground for Harrah's Cherokee Casino and during the initial negotiations for the state gaming compact. Prior to running for elected office, he also served as the General Manager of the Boundary Tree Motel, one of the tribe's first enterprises.

Parker served in the United States Army and is a veteran of the Korean Conflict.

He is survived by two sisters Elba Crain and Christine Parker Buchanan, three brothers Carroll, Don and Thomas Parker, and children Forrest Gerard Parker, Joshua Thomas Parker, James R. Welch, Brad Parker, Gerena Parker and Lori Lambert. Parker also has 12 grandchildren and 33 nieces and nephews.

A Memorial Celebration of Life is planned for Monday, Dec. 10 at the Chief Joyce Dugan Cultural Arts Center. The public is invited to attend the Celebration of Life which will begin at 1pm. Memorials may be made in honor of Parker to the Cherokee Indian Hospital Foundation, Caller Box C-268, Cherokee, North Carolina 28719.

Cobell Settlement checks are coming

Elouise Cobell, a member of the Blackfeet Tribe of Montana, decided in 1996 that enough was enough and she was tired of not having a resolution to the Indian Trust Fund situation. On June 10 of that year, she filed a lawsuit (Cobell v. Salazar) against the federal government in the hopes of finding a solution and resolution.

Now, more than sixteen years later, trust account holders will begin seeing money. A \$3.4 billion settlement was reached in 2010 and approved by U.S. Senior District Judge Thomas F. Hogan in June 2011. A total of \$1.5 billion is to be disbursed to account holders and the remaining \$1.9 billion is is being set in a land consolidation fund. Secretary of the Interior Ken Salazar (defendant named in the original lawsuit) announced on Monday, Nov. 26 the final approval of the settlement and said funds will begin to be disbursed.

"With the settlement now final, we can put years of discord behind us and start a new chapter in our nation-to-nation relationship," said Salazar. "Today marks another historic step forward in President Obama's agenda of reconciliation and empowerment for Indian Country and begins a new era of trust administration."

Sadly, Cobell will not personally see any of the funds as she passed away on Oct. 16, 2011 at the age of 65.

Following Judge Hogan's approval of the settlement last year, Cobell commented, "For over 100 years, individual Indians have been victimized by the government's gross mismanagement of the Individual Indian Trust and our trust assets, including the income earned on our trust lands. Fifteen (15) years of intense, difficult litigation is more than enough. Too many of us have died without justice. Any more delays will mean that still more will die without justice. Enough is enough."

GCG, Inc. has been named by a court as the Claims Administrator in charge of disbursing the \$1.5 billion to around 500,000 account holders. The money will be put into an account at court-approved JP Morgan Chase bank.

"We will continue to work with GCG to ensure it has the information it needs to make expeditious and accurate payments," said Deputy Secretary of the Interior David J. Hayes. "At the same time, we're focused on making meaningful improvements to our trust administration so that we're more transparent, responsive and accountable in managing these substantial funds and assets."

President Obama commented on the final approval, "I welcome the final approval of the Cobell settlement agreement, clearing the way for reconciliation between the trust beneficiaries and the federal government. While Elouise Cobell, the named plaintiff in this case, is no longer with us, her legacy will be a renewed commitment to our trust relationship with Indian Country. I thank her for her honorable work. and also want to thank the leaders at the Department of the Interior, Justice and Treasury who helped reach this conclusion."








The new class includes: Kelly Bradley, from EBCI/IT; Nikki Crisp, business owner/stylist; Sky Kanott, Cherokee Youth Council; Lana Lambert, Cherokee VOC; Eddie Paul, Harrah's Cherokee Casino; and Kevin Welch, Cherokee Cooperative Extension Service.

The group worked to created a set of core values based, the community model of the seven Cherokee Core Values. They used those principles to established ground rules for themselves as a group. The Right Path program teaches leadership skills based on selfless service to others. The group got to hear from Doug French and Eddie Hill from the Big Cover Free labor Group. Free Labor groups are the model of "Ga-du-gi," selfless service to all. French and Hill explained that here are around 15-20 members, nine who are there regularly. Big Cove Free Labor does not receive any funds from the tribal government. They do their own fundraisers and have their own bank

account. Big Cove Free Labor is supported and sustained through fundraisers like Turkey shoots. They are very proud that they are able to operate on their own.

"Free labor is something you want to do because it's all volunteer work," Hill said.

When asked how their chain of command works, they were quick to say that Free Labor doesn't work like that.

"All the workers are leaders," French responded. "There was a messenger back when there weren't phones who would run door-to-door and told everybody where to go to help."

The group was curious how this program will survive.

French said, "Young people start when they see their parents working and helping out, it's good training ground for children." he said. Both men agreed that Free Labor is good way to teach discipline to the young.

"It should be mandatory for the young ones to get that kind of experience," said French.

CHS history students visit Old Salem

LD SALEM - The U.S. History Honors classes of Heath Robertson and Kelley Canaday took a field trip on Saturday, Dec. 1 to Old Salem. Students included Kayla Bradley, Chicoah Ledford, Derrick Ledford, Jalon Lossiah, Joi Owle, Silas Reed-Littlejohn, Miranda Smith, Stephen Swan, and Taran Swimmer. The purpose of the trip was to give students a first-hand look at history. They could use all five senses to add to the classroom lecture and textbook reading in order to create a better understanding of the facts and perspectives of the time period and life in North Carolina.

They left Cherokee High School at 5:15 a.m. on Saturday morning and stopped in Asheville for breakfast. They hit the road again and arrived at Old Salem just before the exhibits opened. The students watched an introductory film of Old Salem's history and development, sampled drinks and treats from the Visitor Center Snack Bar, walked around the exhibits in the Visitor Center, and explored the gift store. They enjoyed dressing up in the Union and Confederate hats and playing with the toy muskets.

When the exhibits opened, the group crossed over the covered bridge to walk up Main Street. The first stop was the gun shop. The exhibit guide demonstrated how a musket was crafted, assembled, and loaded. He spoke of the history of the shop and gunsmith. Students were very engaged in listening to his stories, asking questions, and observing the artifacts in the shop. Several beautifully detailed muskets, pistols, and other items were on display that sparked the students' interest. One student even noticed a copy of the Cherokee Phoenix posted on the wall.

The group continued to stroll down the cobblestone sidewalk to the tavern. The students heard about the history of the site, what the roles of women and men were during the time period, and methods

of entertainment. Students had the opportunity to play period games that were located in the men's assembling area. Games included: Life (not the modern version), Tanagrams, Checkers, and Chess. They also tested a mattress of the time pe riod.

Their favorite stop along the tour was the bakery. They tasted cookies, cakes, and cheese stars made from ingredients of the time period using cooking and baking methods and equipment from the time period. They observed demonstrators cooking over open fires, using brick ovens, and heating water for dishes and laundry purposes. The students asked lots of questions about the equipment and these methods. They were curious about the meats hanging from ceiling, spices being dried, and the variety of breads cooling on racks.

Students were really inquisitive when exploring the Old Salem's Apothecary (the physician and drug store). The guide presented medicines, methods, and tools used for surgery and healing by physicians of the time period. He offered to help fix anyone with a toothache using the crude and painful tooth key used to extract teeth. Stephen Swan quickly volunteered, but he changed his mind quickly when he heard how it would be used.

Students respectfully explored the Moravian Church graveyard called "God's Acre." On the way back, the students explored a newer exhibit which was erected to explore the African-American perspective of the history of Old Salem. They explain how in the beginning of the settlement, there was unity and equality between the two races. Slowly, as slavery increased in the South, separation of the races was implemented. A separate church was built at the other end of Church Street for the African Americans. The first structure was the African Moravian Log Church. The second structure was made from brick. This structure was later expanded to include a Sunday school. This church also contained a graveyard. For the past several years, this structure is undergoing an archaeological excavation. Students were able to see the negative and positive impacts of archaeology on a site as well as the impact of prejudice and racism in American history. They were surprised to hear that it did not start that way.

Students stopped in Statesville on the way back for a late lunch and arrived back at Cherokee High School around 5:30 p.m. Both students and chaperones were tired from the long day, but it was a wonderful experience that promoted hands-on learning and a greater understanding of history, the people, the region, and concepts.

Heath Robertson said, "We try to take this trip every year with the students, and we will continue to take this trip because the students seem to really enjoy it."

Kelley Canaday said, "It was nice having the opportunity to get to know the students outside the classroom and seeing the students experience history coming to life."


