Cherokee youth tour new hospital site

“What are they digging a hole for?”

“Are they building a play-ground?”

Those were just a few of the questions asked as elementary school students at the Cherokee Youth Center (CYC) toured the construction site for the new Cherokee Indian Hospital on Thursday, July 10.

Austin McKinney, Robins & Morton project engineer, gave the youth a tour of the site and helped describe what is going on. “This is for the new hospital,” he told the children who donned safety vests and hard hats for safety while on the tour. “We have an existing hospital, and we’re building a new one right over there...we’ll be building this for about the next year and a half.”

“We’ve got a lot of work to do. You’ll see a lot of big machinery out there, and a lot of guys working really hard at it.”

When asked about the overall progress at the site, McKinney commented, “We’re a little over halfway through with the mass excavation which is cutting that big mountain down and hauling it off to another part of the site. Now, we’re coming out of the ground with steel and concrete so that’s the basement level where the kitchen and support services will be.”

He added, “Then, we’ll get to building A which will be a three-story area, then building B, C, and building D which will connect to the existing facility. We are just

getting started with concrete, and we’ll be soon to start setting steel so it’s going to start happening fast.”

Candy Crowe, CYC education supervisor, related that the children will be an integral part of the new hospital. “Jody Bradley and I are working on an art project with the kids for the new hospital, and she thought it would be a good idea for them to visit the site so they can understand and get a better con-

cept.”

The art project will be three-fold and will include photography, drawings, and the construction of a mobile that will hang from the ceiling. Crowe noted that the site visit will greatly help the children as they work on their art.

“Somehow, somewhere, the art will be incorporated into the new hospital,” said Crowe who added that the children will also do paint-

ings on hardhats.

The new 140,000 square foot hospital is being built adjacent to the current hospital and is expected to open in spring 2016. The hospital will cost \$75 million, and the 10-year note is being financed at a rate of 1.95 percent through First Citizens Bank.



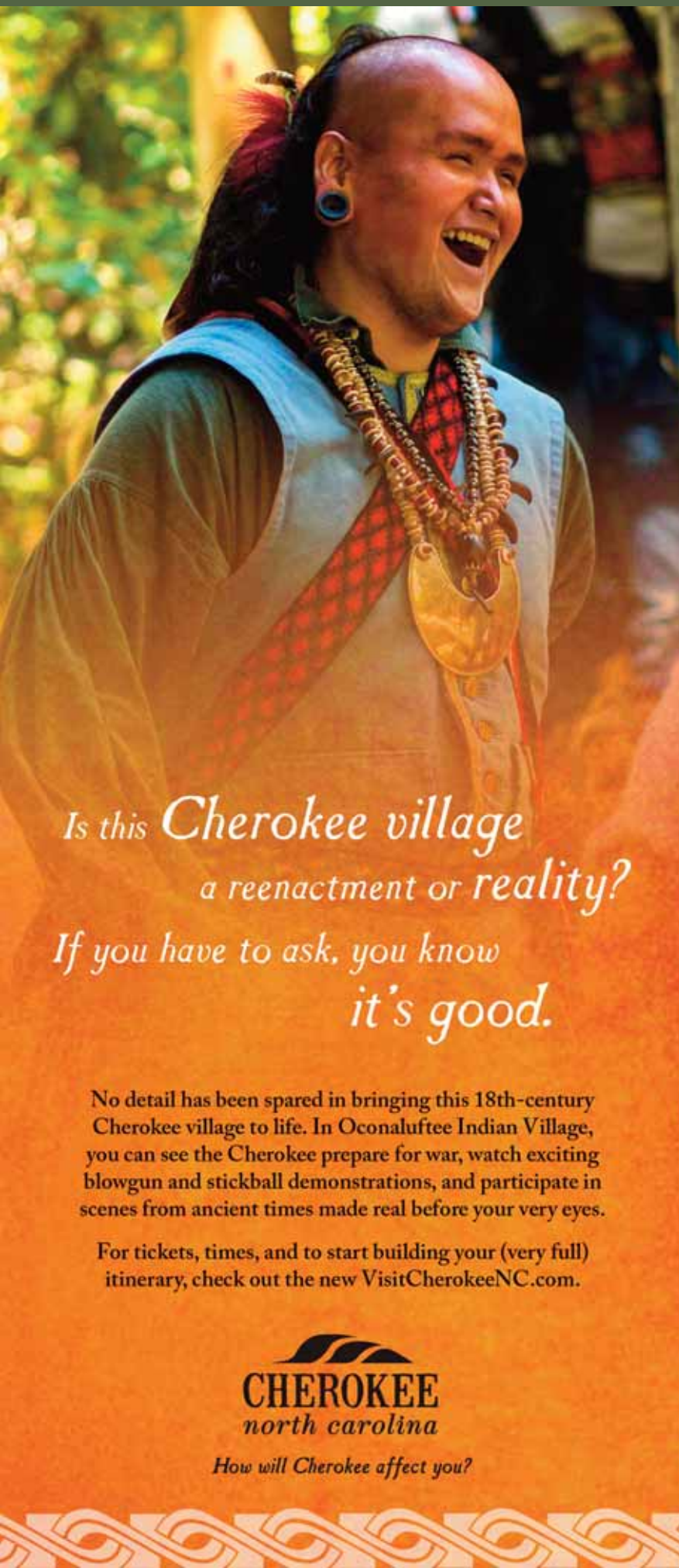

House fire on Tooni Branch

The EBCI Public Safety Communication Center received a report at 8:32am on Thursday, July 10 of a house fire at 495 Tooni Branch Rd. in Cherokee. The initial reporting party said the structure was fully involved.

Cherokee Fire & Rescue responded and found the residence fully involved, as reported into dispatch by the initial responder on scene. The structure was a two-

story home located approximately ½ a mile off Wrights Creek Rd, on Tooni Branch Rd. The owner of the home was not present at the time.

There were no injuries with CF&R personnel and no other structures were affected by the fire. As of this release, there is an on-going investigation to determine the cause.

What is Housing Services and what can it do for me?

We have several programs we offer enrolled members interested in obtaining homeownership on the reservation.

Packaging Mortgage Loans

We assist individuals in applying for mortgage loans through two lenders: Wells Fargo and First Citizens Banks. Based on certain lending criteria the bank establishes, applicants are offered to apply to the bank which best suits their needs.

Applicants are given the option to apply directly to the bank or can have their credit reviewed by Homebuyer Coordinators prior to applying to determine credit worthiness. If necessary, applicants are given direction on how to improve their credit to obtain a mortgage loan in the future.

Down Payment Assistance

When an applicant is pre-qualified for a mortgage loan on the reservation, Housing Services will offer down payment assistance of 20% of the contract/purchase price up to \$30,000 maximum. This loan is to be repaid over a five-year term after the mortgage loan is satisfied.

Rate Buy Down Assistance

HCD Housing Services will assist mortgagees on the reservation with funds to purchase discount points to lower the interest rate offered by the bank. These funds are not payable and

Portfolio Program

HCD Housing Services offers the Portfolio Program to potential homebuyers who have minor blemishes on their credit report. Applicants must demonstrate a willingness and effort to repair their credit prior to applying for this program. The Portfolio Program is funded through gaming revenue and availability varies. The Portfolio loan is only used as an applicant's last resort.

What if I don't have land?

HCD Housing Services maintains a Land List of individuals who do not have land or who have land that has been deemed not buildable for housing purposes by Site Prep "Infrastructure." Eligible individuals can pick up the Land Inquiry form from our office located at 756 Acquoni Road.

When parcels become available, Homebuyer Coordinators will contact individuals according to their place on the Land List and will assist with packaging the mortgage loan. Individuals MUST BE able to obtain a mortgage loan in order to purchase lots.

What if I don't have credit or less than perfect credit?

We have a lending institution that works with individuals who have no credit by using "non-traditional" sources, such as utility bills, vehicle insurance, satellite radio services, cellphone bills, etc.

Applicants with less than perfect credit may be considered eligible for the Portfolio Program.

What if I want to purchase off the reservation?

One of our friendly staff will assist you in applying and packaging the mortgage loan; however, we are unable to offer down payment assistance or rate-buy-down funds with purchases made off the reservation.

What should I expect when I make an appointment with a Homebuyer Coordinator?

Your Homebuyer Coordinator will review your credit report with you and discuss existing issues and the best plan to obtain homeownership. Applicants need not bring any documents to the intake appointment. However, applicants must be enrolled, be employed, have a satisfactory credit history & score and meet standard affordability guidelines to apply for a mortgage loan. Mortgage loan approval is issued by the lender.

Finance presents Tribal Audit findings

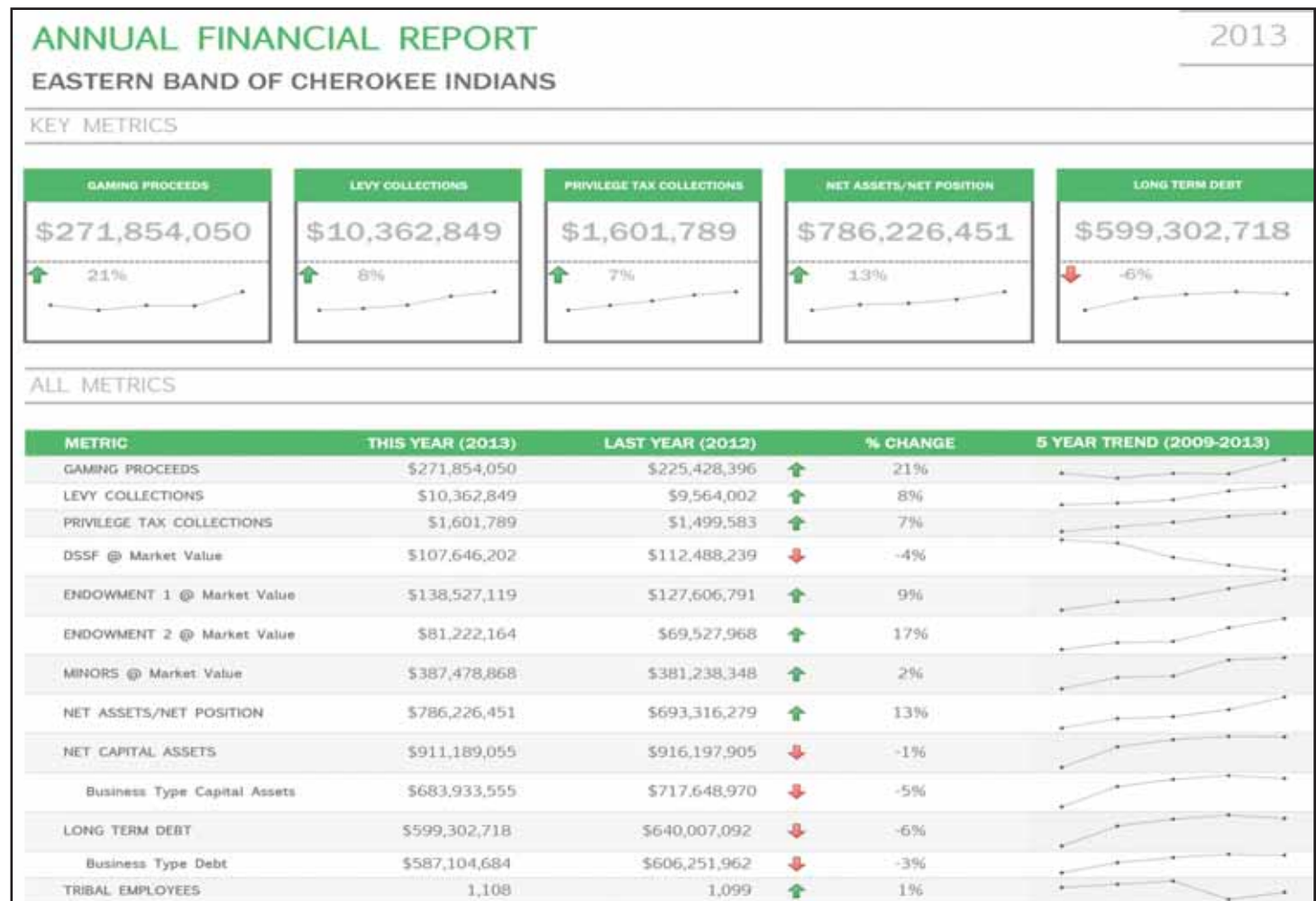

The EBCI Budget and Finance Department presented the FY13 audited financial statements to Tribal Council on Tuesday, July 8. Each year, the Tribe has an independent audit to provide reasonable assurance that the financial statements are fairly presented in accordance with generally-accepted accounting principles (GAAP).

The FY13 audit was conducted by the firm of Dixon Hughes Goodman, LLP, of Asheville, and the Tribe received an unqualified or “clean” opinion.

“Budget and Finance has worked very hard to own our financials, an end product that most tribal governments don’t have the privilege of saying,” said Kim Peone, Deputy of Finance. “It takes a competent team to accomplish this, and it’s a product of our budgeting process where we develop our priorities and quantify them. The audit report is what we see as a report card for our work. We are striving for excellence through accountability, transparency, relationships and community. This audit is the result of that.”

For FY13, the report was expanded from the minimum required basic fi-



ncial statements to the more Comprehensive Annual Financial Report. The goal is to provide a report that will be easier to read and understand. There were two sections added to the report – an Introductory Section and a Statistical Section. The Introductory Section provides general information about the Tribe and includes narrative updates on major initiatives that were originally highlighted in the annual budgeting process. The Statistical Section provides information relating to financial trends and reflects the de-

mand for services or the level of services being provided.

The Tribe’s financial position is strong and continues to grow with an increase in net position of \$92.9 million to bring the total net position to just over \$786 million. This does not include Component Units or Fiduciary Funds such as the Pension Trust Funds and the Minors Fund. The 13 percent increase in net position resulted primarily from an increase in cash and investments along with a decrease in long-term debt.

Definitions:

Gaming Proceeds - Net income from gaming operations

Levy Collections - Levy (Sales Tax) collected from businesses licensed by the Tribe. Current levy rate is 7.5%

Privilege Tax Collection - Privilege (Occupancy) tax collected from business licensed by the Tribe. Current privilege tax rate is 3%

DSSF - Debt Service Sinking Fund; for retiring tribal debt.

Market Value – the amount for which something can be sold on a particular market.

Endowment 1 – the tribe’s emergency reserve fund for catastrophic, unforeseen events.

Endowment 2 – the tribe’s capital improvement and business investment reserve fund.

Minors – the Minor’s Trust Fund.

Net Assets/Net Position – is the overall “net worth” of the tribe excluding fiduciary funds such as the employee pension and minors trust fund; those held for the benefit of others.

Net Capital Assets – total value of all capital assets

Capital Asset – an asset with a useful life longer than one year and not intended for sale during the normal course of business.

Business Type – the business or commercial operations of the Tribe, such as the gaming operation.

Long Term Debt – a bank loan or other obligation for a term longer than one year.

Business Type Debt – debt of the business or commercial operations of the Tribe, such as the gaming operation.

Patrick Nelson Lambert, Randall Crowe, and Kacey Jo Tilley are interning this summer at the Cherokee Tribal Court. Below are their bios.

Patrick Nelson Lambert completed his first year of law school at Charlotte School of Law. He is of the Birdtown Community and is the son of Patrick and Cynthia Lambert. His wife, Kimberly Lambert, is living in Charlotte where she is a nutritionist for Mecklenburg County WIC Department.

Nelson received his bachelor's of arts degree in english-literature from the University of Tennessee – Knoxville. In his first year in law school, Nelson achieved the honor of Dean' List for the fall and spring semester. He is the founding vice-president of the Native American Students Association (NALSA) at Charlotte Law.

Nelson was selected to be the Area 5 representative for National NALSA, which covers the entire eastern region of the U.S. Nelson made the Trial Advocacy Honor Board, which is Charlotte Law's Trial team. He is also the secretary of the Employment Law Society.

When asked how he is able to achieve all of these honors while maintaining such a high GPA, Nelson

said, "Home is my motivation, from the elders, to the children in the Kituawah Academy. My people are the reason I went to law school. I will come back home when I am finished with school and do my part to help strengthen and improve everyone's way of life. I push myself so that I can inspire others to follow in my footsteps and to raise the bar higher. Also, my wife Kim keeps me grounded. Without her in my life, law school would have consumed me. She is my life balance."

Randall Crowe was born and raised in Cherokee. He attended Cherokee Elementary and Smoky Mountain High school. In high school, he was a representative for the Wolftown community on the Junaluska Leadership Counsel. After high school,

he joined the Navy and served four years on the USS Enterprise as an Aviation Ordnance Third-class petty officer. He received an unprecedented four-month early release from active duty as a reward for his commitment to receiving an education while serving.

Two weeks after being released from active duty, he started school at Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond, Va. where he was a founding member of the Native American Student Association at VCU and a member of the Student Veterans Association. He finished his bachelor's degree in 3 ½ years and majored in homeland security and emergency preparedness, and criminal justice. He has recently completed his first year at Charlotte

School of Law where he is also the founding Treasurer of the Native American Law Student Association.

Kacey Jo Tilley is a rising second year law student at North Carolina Central University School of Law located in Durham. She is from the city of Raleigh. Kacey graduated cum laude from the Honor's College at Western Carolina University with a bachelor's of science degree in criminal justice and criminology in December 2012.

While in college, she was an active sister of Phi Mu Fraternity and was also a resident assistant in Blue Ridge Hall and Walker Hall. At NC Central School of Law, Kacey is a member of the pro-bono program and plans to participate in Durham County's "Teen Court" upon returning to Durham. She is also a lifeguard and lifeguarding instructor at NC Central's campus recreation center and teaches swimming lessons in her spare time. Teams are scheduled to square off in traditional Cherokee stickball, as well as the traditional courting game called "fish." Though

there are no contests among festival food vendors, cloggers, musical performers, shape-note singers, or living history demonstrators, you will find many old and new favorites.

Admission and parking still will be free at WCU's daylong celebration of Southern Appalachian music, arts, dance and history.

Mountain Heritage Day and its many competitions are only weeks away – always the last Saturday in September. There's plenty of time to start growing, sewing and canning; and to practice chopping, polishing and jogging.

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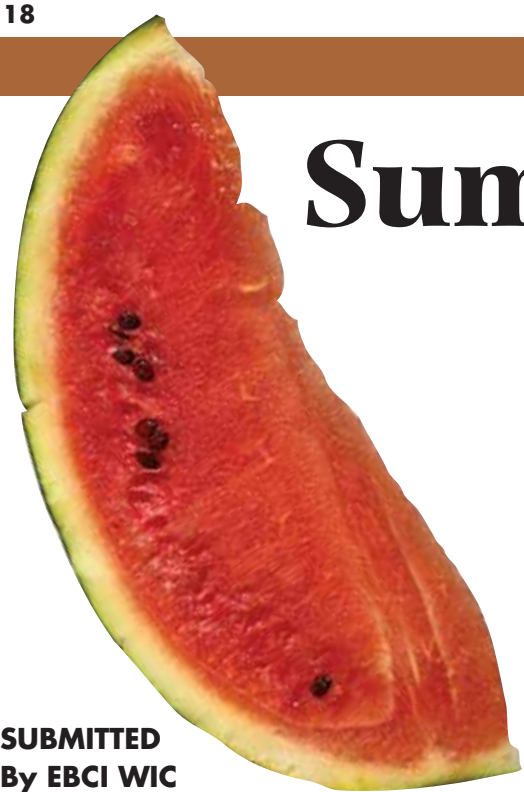

Summer hydration tips

do is to keep well hydrated while playing or working outside. Here are some good suggestions:

- 1) Keep drinking plenty of water. Don't like plain water? Try putting cut-up fruit, such as strawberries, orange slices, pineapple chunks or watermelon in a pitcher of water. This can add flavor without adding a lot of sugar or calories. You can also try frozen juice cubes or squeezing lemon or lime juice for extra flavor.
- 2) Keep foods that are high in water density for snacks, such as watermelon, grapes, cantaloupes and honeydews.
- 3) Avoid caffeine. Too much caffeine can actually cause dehydration.
- 4) Keep calorie-reduced sports drinks handy if you or your child is sweating profusely while playing sports or working outdoors. When you

sweat your body loses fluid, carbohydrates and sodium, sports drinks are designed to replace these electrolytes.

- 5) Check your urine color. Your urine color should be pale yellow. If you see a dark yellow color, you are not drinking enough water.
- 6) Watch for signs of dehydration. Some of these are: headaches, dizziness, cramps, irritability and energy loss.
- 7) Take plenty of shady rest breaks while outdoors.

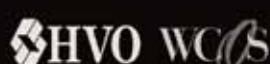
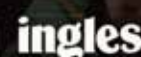
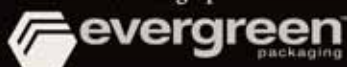

EBCI Official Letters of Residency and 911 Addressing Requirements

Before the EM/911 office can issue a letter of residency on Tribal Land, a valid document is needed such as a current year utility bill, lease/rental agreement, land parcel statement from the BIA, etc. The EM/911 will not accept a state-issued driver's license or ID card that is a year past the date of issuance.

A physical address can be applied for as soon as the driveway has been established

Once the address has been assigned, the driveway cannot be moved, as this is a distance measurement for residence or business.

Please post the assigned 911 Address number(s) directly on the house and/or business which can be seen from the roadway. If the house and/or business cannot be seen from the roadway, a second set of numbers should be posted at the entrance of the driveway.

Tourist season is always a busy and exciting time in Cherokee. Local folks and tourists enjoy the sights of summer and the downtown area is packed with shoppers. A common scene is the street or road-side dancers performing in the middle of a huddle of happy men, women and children. Many times, these dancers are the first impression of Cherokee the visitor encounters. Sometimes, it is a positive experience with people getting great entertainment and education. Other times, the visitors leave the performance with a very negative

view of what it is to be Cherokee. Cherokee has permitted this activity for decades. The dancers are independent business people or individuals hired by shops in town to draw prospective clients. The dancers typically perform dances that are not related to the culture of the Cherokee people. Those commonly done are generally grouped under the term "pow wow" dances and tend to be more western in nature.

Many of the dancers will explain to the public the cultural differences in the dress and dance that they perform. They take pride in making sure that they have a good appearance and courteous conduct. Others are not so much interested in

putting the Tribe's best foot forward and the desire for short term gain sometimes prevents them from seeing the benefit of change.

Those who are in the tourism-related businesses, including those who dance at our local establishments, benefit greatly from understanding that good customer service and attention to appearance result in positive experiences for our guests. Those positive experiences turn into more income, repeat visits and a perception that the community takes pride in the product that it delivers.

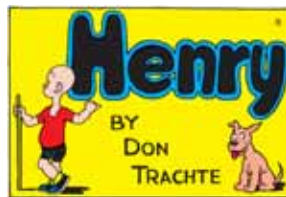

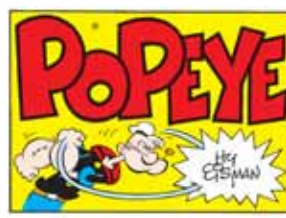

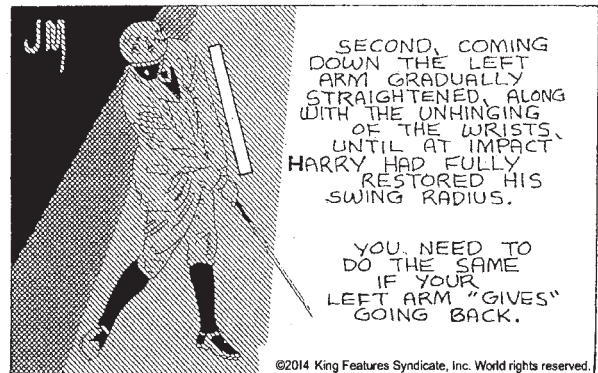
