Nicolette Marlena Crowe summed up the entire evening as she sang "The Climb" during Cherokee High School's graduation on Friday, May 28. It has been a climb as this was the first class to graduate from the new school which took many years and many thousands of hours to plan, coordinate, and build.

Sixty-two seniors walked the stage and received their diplomas on Friday evening as a capacity crowd packed the Cultural Center.

"This is a new chapter for Cherokee High School," said Principal Chief Michell Hicks. "This is a new chapter for the Eastern Band."

Ray Kinsland, "The Voice of the Braves", gave the commencement speech during what was reported as the 53rd Cherokee High School graduation he has attended. He commended the graduates on their accomplishments and told them to always strive high in life and keep faith on their side.

Nicolas Dalton Squirrell was honored as the Valedictorian and Jamie Lyn Pusch was honored as the Salutatorian. Squirrell also was recognized with the Principal Chief's Award and the Cherokee Kiwanis Club Award. Pusch received the NAIWA Award.

CHS class president Alisha Rae Long told of some of the accomplishments of the Class of 2010, and she was recognized with the Principal Chief's Award as well. Both her and Squirrell will receive their awards during the regular Tribal Council meeting on Thursday, June 3.

A slide show presentation honoring the Class of 2010 was shown prior to the awarding of diplomas.

One special recognition occurred as the diploma of Stephane Wayne Ruth was awarded posthumously to his family. A member of the Class of 2010, he passed away in February and his photo was displayed in a chair during the graduation ceremony.

Seven students graduated with "Highest Honors" designation including: Squirrell, Pusch, Long, Nicolas Joanne Garcia, Castanna Marie Miles, Kasdan Ryan Saunooke, and Kira Lee Teesateskie. Miles was also given an award from Cherokee Indian Hospital for academic achievement.

The idea was hatched by Mary Ann Thompson, an EBCI tribal member from the Big Cove Community. "Over the past few years, I have heard several people mention an art market here in Cherokee," she said. "The Cooperative Extension office has organized a farmer's market, and it just seemed a natural fit to host a culture/agriculture market."

She, in turn, discussed the idea with EBCI Travel and Promotion staff as well as the Qualla Arts and Crafts Mutual, Inc. board. Both were on board and the idea ran from there.

"Obviously, this market would provide additional income and exposure for the artist, homemaker and farmer," said Thompson. "Locals would have a place to sell and purchase handmade, homemade and home-grown items. The tourists would benefit and should enjoy the one-on-one contact with the artist."

Sarah McClellan-Welch, EBCI Agriculture Agent, commented, "This market will be great! I think that combining Cherokee Art and Agriculture will make a really pleasant shopping experience. In fact, most of our growers are artists also!"

Mary Jane Ferguson, EBCI Travel & Promotion director, commented, "The Cherokee Homemade -Handmade market for local artists and farmers is a welcomed opportunity that will showcase the beautiful art created in Cherokee."

She continued, "It will also be an opportunity to sample tasty baked goods, local delicacies such as bean bread, chestnut bread, knutchie and the beautiful creations by many talented homemakers and local cooks. The local produce will be a vibrant addition to local arts and will further strengthen the farm to table initiative that so many locals and visitors alike are seeking."

In conjunction with the educational aspect of gourd art, the aim of the festival is to introduce and offer gourd art and crafts to the general public. Free demos are scheduled throughout the weekend, and the public is invited to watch and participate in popular techniques used in gourd art. All classes have openings available for walk-in students. Students do not have be pre-registered to join in the class offerings. Classes do have fees, which are held down to very reasonable rates to encourage participation and learning. However, there is no charge to attend the Gathering and to participate in the demos, shopping or auction.

Throughout the weekend, nearly 300 Gourd Artists will be participating in more than 100 scheduled workshops, demonstrations, mini-workshops, presentations, and Q&A sessions. Gourd Art Instructors and nationally-acclaimed artists from around the country have teamed up to provide a wide variety of techniques from their areas of expertise.

The auction Saturday evening at 8pm, which is also open to the public, features a wide variety of finished gourd art, raw gourds, gourd-related items, and other art. On Friday evening at 7:30pm local musicians The Smoky Mountain Drifters will be performing.

"Do you have a passport?" Sonny Ledford, a member of the Warriors of Anikituwah, asked a visitor to the Qualla Boundary on Thursday, May 27. The question was asked of numerous tourists as the EBCI Travel & Promotion department kicked off their 2010 Cherokee Passport campaign by handing out the tourism booklets to motorists entering the reservation via the Great Smoky Mountains National Park.

The Passport contains discount coupons to various local businesses, a list of 101 free things to do in Cherokee, a guide to the Painted Bear Trail, a calendar of events in Cherokee, and a map of Cherokee.

"This is about our new passport program, our new advertising tool to let people know how to get around Cherokee," Robert Jumper, EBCI Travel & Promotions manager, said of Thursday's event. "We're having a little photo shoot to let people have some fun with it. We're having some of our Warriors stop traffic and ask to see their passport. If they don't have one, well, they're going to get one anyway, but at least they have a little fun and get introduced to our new passport."

Mary Jane Ferguson, EBCI Travel & Promotions director, said the idea for the Cherokee Passport was developed this year. "It's to get people to circulate through town. A lot of times our visitors, we have found, either come to downtown and they don't go anywhere else or they come to Saunooke Village and then turn around and go back to Gatlinburg or Pigeon Forge. We want those visitors who either frequent the casino or have a favorite place that they like to go to know that there is more to Cherokee than that. We have an expanded retail area and our goal is to get people into these shops, into motels to stay overnight and into restaurants."

Ledford distributed Passports on Thursday along with fellow Warriors Daniel Tramper and Mike Crowe Jr. "What we've done today is promotional for the Cherokee people here on our Boundary," said Ledford. "We volunteered to do this to help the tourism that comes into our Boundary. They actually get to see what real Cherokee warriors look like. Also, when we do these things for our people, our schools, things like this, it's made a big impact on the Tsalagi people by teaching and educating about our culture, our past, the history, and the truth. A lot of times the truth isn't spoken."

He concluded, "From us here as the Warriors of Anikituwah, we hope that tourism keeps coming and that we keep educating more of the public."

Being an immersion parent creates a unique bond between the parent and the teacher. Our children were babies when this process began. It was definitely scary to turn over our children to a new setting, when they were already responding to the English language. We were the second batch, and along with our excitement came the responsibility of knowing that this was a huge undertaking. When would we know this would work? How long will it take for my child to understand? Am I making the right decision on behalf of my child? As parents, we took a leap of faith, and never looked back.

I'm going to share some thoughts from our parents on this advancing class now, so you can see through their eyes our success and happiness:

- Monica Herbold and Kimsey Taylor – Alitima uses the language with her grandmother, and recognizes the Syllabary. She loves to read her Syllabary books, and enjoys putting her knowledge to use.

- Katie Johnson – great aunt of Denili Hill – says "He makes me happy to hear him use what he knows and want to learn new words."

These children have been blessed with a tremendous opportunity that will grow with them not only as individuals, but as future scholars of this Tribe."

- Myself and Dan – "Our pre-k children were born Cherokee, but truly manifest their God-given inheritance each & every day. Tsini's classmates are her family, and her teachers have patiently guided the children, giving them the tools to excel and expand in the Cherokee Language."

- Lechay Arch and Terrence Littlejohn -

"This gave me & my family an opportunity that would make a huge difference in restoring something that is so important to the Tribe. The language is the identity of the Cherokee People. It let's us know who we are, where we come from, and most of all that we no longer need to be scared to speak in our Native tongue."

- Michelle Wolfe - Denili did not start out in this classroom. However, when I was told that he would be moving up I was scared that he wouldn't know as much as the others. He was already shy and didn't talk much. After talking to the parents of the children who were already in the class and other staff members they reassured me that this was a great class. I was told "These are three of the best teachers, they are strong and Denili will learn a lot from the other children". That was very true. These teachers are great and I am glad Denili could be a part of there class. My mother is so proud to hear him use what he knows and I can see on her face when he talks to her she is grateful for this program too.

Words that were used by our parents to describe our teachers and our experience with them: Family, Patience, Devotion, Appreciation, Blessing, Beloved, Thankful, A Wonderful Team, Success, Happiness, The Best.

Joni Hill said it best about our teachers "We parents could not ask for anyone better than you guys. You are awesome. It's hard for us to let you go."

As for those questions when had at the beginning?

When would we know this would work? Here & now.

How long will it take for my child to understand? A little while, but a lot quicker than we thought.

Am I making the right decision on behalf of my child? On behalf of the parents of our little Pre – K class, the answer is a resounding "Yes."

It is harder for us to watch our children move to Kindergarten than it is for them. Because of your guidance, they are fluent speakers. Because of your teachings, they are advanced in their educational skills. Because of your loving class environment, they have excelled. Because of their Blood, they are Cherokee. But because of you – they are fluent.

For our parents, teachers, and children - We are a unique & special family. One that has grown, changed, and made a difference.

Sgi. We love you. The difference you've made in our lives is monumental. You will always be our heroes.

Others remember testing out their cooking skills as young people by feeding the Free Labor Members who came to work on projects.

"If they ate all the food you made," said Melvena Swimmer, "then you knew your cooking was good enough and you had passed some kind of test or rights of passage, and could cook for others too." Phyllis Shell, whose husband Big Cove Rep. Perry Shell is a member of the group, sang "You are the Wind Beneath my Wings," in the group's honor. At the end of the story sharing session, Swimmer, MMS Board President, presented a plaque to the Free Labor Group as Peacemaker for 2010.

Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault in Later Life

SUBMITTED By EBCI DOMESTIC VIOLENCE & SEXUAL ASSAULT PROGRAM

Domestic or intimate partner, violence is typically thought to be a problem for women of childbearing age. Unfortunately, little research has been done on the problem of domestic violence in later life. Research has focused on elder abuse and neglect.

• Older females experience higher rates of abuse than older males, even after accounting for their larger proportion of the aging population. Although females make up about 57% of the total national elderly population, women are the victims in 76.3% of reports of emotional/psychological abuse, 71.4% of physical abuse, 63% of financial/material exploitation, and 60% of neglect.

• Research suggests that for functionally independent older women, physical and verbal abuse – mainly from intimate partners – is occurring at rates similar to that for younger women.

Elder sexual assault occurs when a person over the age of 60 is forced, tricked, coerced, or manipulated into ANY unwanted sexual contact. It also includes sexual contact with anyone who is unable to give informed consent. Unfortunately, some older persons are a prime target due to their decreased functioning and/or reliance on caretakers, which makes them less likely to report, fight back, or be believed.

Sexual abuse is believed to be the least reported of all victimizations against the elderly. Only 30% of people age 65 or older who are victimized report the sexual assault to the police. Risk Factors for Older Adults

• Advanced age (older than 75); functional dependency; shared living arrangements; social isolation; depression; having a personality disorder; cognitive impairment; excessive use of drugs or alcohol; and confusion.

• Physical weakness and frailty make older adults more vulnerable.

• Some older adults have declining cognitive function

making it difficult to communicate to details of an assault.
Dependence on others for daily living makes it impossible for some older adults to leave an uncomfortable situation.

What are the signs?

Because older adults may be unable to communicate verbally or express details of an assault, it is sometimes up to friends, caregivers, and family members to recognize the signs of sexual abuse. (Please understand that not all of the symptoms listed below will always point to sexual assault).

• Bruising on inner thighs, vaginal bleeding. STD's, difficulty in walking or standing, pain or itching in genital areas, sudden exacerbation of existing illnesses, frequent physical problems such as headaches, allergies, or stomach problems, depression or anxiety, agitation, withdrawal or fearfulness, aggression, over-compliance, suicide attempts, isolation, and increased anger or hostility.

Barriers to seeking help

A victim may not seek help because of:FEAR

Of further abuse

- Of alienation or loss of caregivers
- Of losing health benefits
- Of being placed in a nursing home
- Of losing home and property

• Discouragement by caregivers for the victim to take action

- Reluctance to seek a divorce
- Lack of affordable housing options
- Shame and embarrassment

• Non-recognition of abuse; most older victims came of age during a time when education and independence were not encouraged for women

• Apathy and belief that nothing can change based on a lack of support from the community or family in the early years of the abuse

- Diminishing health and vigor
- Realities of physical aging and issues of loneliness.

Tina Heimer's Molasses Cookies

Tina Heimer's Molasses Cookies

By SHEENA BRINGS PLENTY, CPC

This recipe has been one of my favorites since I was a kid. It was given to my mom by a grandma in her hometown of Cresco, Iowa. These cookies are great for all occasions. We used to make them for powwows, family dinners and gatherings, gifts and, of course, holidays. Be careful, though, because once you make them, your friends and family will be begging you to make more because they're completely addictive!

Ingredients

- ³/₄ cup softened margarine
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 1 egg
- ¹/₄ cup molasses
- 2 tsp. baking soda
- ¹/₄ tsp. salt
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. cloves
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 tsp. ginger 2¹/₄ cups all-purpose flour
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup water
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup granulated sugar

Directions

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1. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees.

2. Mix the margarine and brown sugar together by hand or in an electric mixer fitted with the paddle attachment.3. Add in the egg and molasses and mix until fully incorporated.

4. Sift the baking soda, salt, cloves, cinnamon, ginger and flour together in a separate bowl to remove any lumps. Then mix into the molasses mixture and blend until just incorporated.
5. Cover the bowl with plastic wrap and chill the dough for 20 minutes. In the meantime, fill one bowl with the water and fill another bowl with the granulated sugar.

6. Once the dough has been chilled, roll it into 1-inch balls using a small spoon, tablespoon, or your hands. Dip the top of each ball into the water, then into the sugar and place sugar-side up on an ungreased sheet tray. Place 12 balls per sheet tray – 3 across the top and 4 down. 7. Bake about 10-12 minutes, cool on a wire rack, and store in an airtight container.

ATV Training to be held

ATV training will be behind the Microtel Motel in Cherokee, NC on June 12, July 24, and Aug. 28. Classes Start at 10am and involve a half-day, hands-on ATV RiderCourseSM to learn the proper and safe use of all-terrain vehicles. The ATV RiderCourse is conducted by certified instructors from the nationally recognized ATV Safety Institute (ASI), which has been conducting these courses for more than 20 years.

For more information check online at www.atvsafety.org (click on "Online Enrollment") or by calling (800) 887-2887. The ASI ATV RiderCourse is free for purchasers of most new ATVs and it is available to others for a reasonable fee.

Local ASI Instructor Todd Kent, said, "It's critical that riders and non-riders alike understand the importance of the safe and responsible use of ATVs. For example, summer marks a time when children have more free time to enjoy outdoor activities, including riding ATVs. Parental supervision is a key element to a child's safety and children under the age of 16 must be supervised at all times when operating an ATV. Parents literally hold the key to their children's safety. Every ATV has an ignition key, and when a parent or guardian controls the key, they control the ATV's use."

The ATV RiderCourse offers training for youth aged [8-11] where a parent or guardian must be present or participate in the training, as well as training for teens and adults. The course also covers protective gear, environmental responsibility and state and local laws. The ATV Safety Institute also offers free interactive online courses for youth, teens and adults on its website in preparation for taking a hands-on ATV Rider-Course or as a refresher after they have taken a course.
