Hall Mountain ownership returns to EBCI

he Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians (EBCI) and the Land Trust for the Little Tennessee (LTLT) celebrated the deed signing of the Hall Mountain Tract in Macon County back to tribal ownership on May 31.

Hall Mountain, a 108 acre tract of land, is the viewshed of the historic Cowee Mound site which is located six miles south of Franklin. The Mound, a site of great cultural significance to the Tribe, was the largest, busiest diplomatic and commercial center for the Cherokee people and all Native people on the East Coast until the late 1700s. Sharon Taylor, deputy director of the LTLT, worked with the Tribe in 2007 to return Cowee Mound to the EBCI. LTLT is a Franklin-based land trust that works to protect the natural and cultural heritage of the Upper Little Tennessee and Hiwassee River Basins.



This project was a partnership between the LTLT, The Wilderness Society, and the EBCI and is among the first to receive a grant from the newly formed Community Forest and Open Space Conservation Program, one of just 10 recipients nationwide and one of only two in the Southeast to receive funding.

Principal Chief Michell Hicks spoke of Hall Mountain during the Remember the Removal send-off event at Kituwah Mound on Saturday. "Yesterday was a big day for us. We repurchased the Hall Mountain Tract near the Cowee Mound."

The Tribe now possesses Cowee Mound and the Hall Mountain Tract. Referring to another site in Franklin, he continued, "There's a mound in Franklin named Nikwasi. It needs to be back in the hands of the Cherokee."

Principal Chief Hicks, Vice Chief Larry Blythe, Vice-Chairperson Bill Taylor, and LTLT executive director Paul Carlson came to the table to sign the documents for the land transfer.

Along with the land transfer, the celebration featured several speeches by dignitaries and the dancing of the Warriors of Anikituhwah.

A ride to remember

wenty-two Cherokee cyclists are embarking on a journey of a lifetime; a journey that will take them on a path their ancestors took 175 years ago. Traveling over 900 miles by bicycle, the 2013 Remember the Removal Ride participants will retrace the Trail of Tears from New Echota, Ga. to Tahlequah, Okla. during the month of June.

The riders received a blessing from EBCI Beloved Man Jerry Wolfe at a send-off event at the Kituwah Mound on Saturday, June 1. Seven riders from the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians are joining 15 from the Cherokee Nation on the journey. Yona Wade who works at the Cherokee Central Schools. "I am very appreciative of being given the opportunity to go and represent the Eastern Band and better yet getting to go and remember those who went before us. You can't forget. You can't forget it. I think it will be a lifechanging opportunity for me and put a lot of things in perspective and give me more of an opportunity to come back and teach the history of the Cherokee to our people."

Principal Chief Michell Hicks and former Principal Chief Joyce Dugan joined in the send-off event on Saturday. "You have a very tough physical journey, but you also have a very tough emotional journey," said Chief Hicks. "We just want you to know that our prayers are with you. When you get down or you get tired or feel homesick, just remember that there are a lot of prayers being lifted up for you."

Chief Dugan said that the history of the Cherokee Trail of Tears as taught in most public schools is "sadly lacking." She related, "If you look at most textbooks, the Trail of Tears is mentioned in just a few sentences and that's it. I don't think that most people in this country truly know of the impact."

She also gave a brief history on how the Tribe came back into possession of the Kituwah Mound and property.

Judy Castorena, an EBCI tribal member who participated in the 2012 Remember the Removal Ride, told the crowd how the ride changed her life. "It's changed my heart. It's changed my perspective. Now, after this bike ride, I know who I am. I know what I fight for and what I believe in."

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


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
Unto These Hills underway



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

Update from the Cherokee Children's Home

I would like to take up a brief amount of time and space to inform the greater community on some of the recent happenings at the Cherokee Children's Home.

Regarding the construction progress of the new and exciting Children's Home, we are very near beginning construction. We know that it has been some time since we had our groundbreaking ceremony. Some issues have come up that have prolonged our process, but we are committed to not rushing and completing this project with 100 percent accuracy and 100 percent accountability for the money we are spending.

The Cherokee Children's Coali-

We have been in near constant negotiations with contractors in an attempt to retain the best cost for the most quality. This has been quite a task. However, we feel we owe this to the folks who have invested so heartily in this most worthwhile endeavor. Everyone from the Tribe that has contributed \$160,000 so far, HUD with the \$486,000 ICDGB Grant, the Cherokee Preservation Foundation with the \$200,000 contributed so far and the nearly \$250,000 we have been blessed enough to receive from individuals in this community and beyond who recognize this project as a necessity.

While we are as ready as everyone else to begin, we are not finished with our fundraising efforts. We are

constantly working on ideas and strategies to raise the \$400,000 we still need to complete both of the homes this community needs to take care of its most vulnerable and deserving population. There is a current drive underway with the Tribal Employee Payroll Deduction. If you can spare a dollar or two at every payday, we could sure put it to work.

In this exciting and busy time for the Tribe, we understand that some are curious as to why this is taking so long, especially when other projects have come up and have already begun construction. The Children's Home is a Department of the Cherokee Boy's Club and is a non-profit organization. Thusly, it cannot be funded as some of the other projects are and we have to raise our money


the old fashioned way. We know that our current facility has worked for nearly 42 years and our new facility will likely work for just as long or longer. We will be proud and we want everyone to feel that way.

I have also been making rounds to all the community clubs with a short presentation about our project. It has been nice to get out and about and meet folks from all the communities.

Candidate for Painttown Tribal Council Lula "Lou" Jackson

To be a representative of the people of Painttown Community and the Eastern Band of the Cherokee Indians I see this as a position OF the people, and as a candidate I vow to work on your behalf. As I have been visiting homes in the community, the following issues have been identified which are important to the people, the community and Tribe. If elected, your issues will be my priority: I will address all issues that come before Tribal Council.

Education and Professional Experience:

B.S. Social Work, Western Carolina University, A.A.S. Criminal Justice, Southwestern Community College, A.A.S. Drug & Alcohol Technology, Southwestern Technical College, 33+ years working within the tribal system in divisions of Tribal Operations, Health and Medical, and the Operations Division in Public Safety, 4 years with Indian Health Service in Medical, Social Work, Guardian Ad Litem, Co-Chair of Child Protection Team, Case Manager for the Multidisciplinary Team, Member of Mission Children Peer Review team for Forensic Interviewers, Member of the State Child Fatality Review Team, Volunteer for community and tribal events for many years

Specific community issues I will address:

Work to stop soil erosion of small streams that threatens homes *Work to assist family with site prep in their efforts to build a family cemetery with grading and gravel as needed* *Work to ensure house sites are suitable and precautions are made for erosion control*

Work to develop or enhance a community emergency resource program for those in need due to unexpected emergencies *Work to develop a Community Watch program for the community* *Work to develop a community program that will assist with Reading, Math and Language Arts*

Other tribal issues:

*I will support the continued growth of technology within the tribe to ensure our work practices become more streamlined and efficient *I will work to reduce tribal spending and supplement tribal monies through additional grant funding, promote the use of volunteers, interns, retirees and maximize billing for professional services* *I will advocate that Sky Miles and Hotel points be addressed in the Personnel Policies and Procedures; Article 11. Travel Policy, to help reduce travel expenses for programs including elected officials* *I will support the TERO job bank in efforts to actively seek jobs for our residents* *I will support tribal program budgets that are sufficient to provide the services they are set up to deliver. If our mission is to provide services to the people, then we need to ensure that programs are adequately funded to carry out that mission* *Explore ways to *get rid of waiting lists* for paving and home repairs for the elderly and disabled* *I will work to expand mandatory reporting laws to include expectant mothers who are using drugs* *I will work to ensure prevention and outreach programs get the word out *do not get pregnant if you're smoking, using drugs or alcohol, being *clean and sober* includes Suboxone, another drug used to treat drug addiction* *I will advocate to hold birth parents accountable for the cost of medical expenses for babies that test positive for drugs at birth*

Recently, I saw a magazine ad that pictured a beautiful teenage girl with a caption that read "I am addicted and I don't do drugs". Now, imagine our children, our future leaders who have been born—drug addicted and what our future will look like...we must afford our addicted young every opportunity from conception to adulthood to live and thrive in a supportive and drug free community! I will push for legislation that defines the fetus as a human being at the first medical documentation of a heartbeat, to legally charge parents with Child Abuse and forfeit their per capita payments when giving birth to a drug-addicted baby. The lifetime cost of providing care for these infants is going to be in the millions per child, and this problem has reached epidemic proportion impacting 10% to 15% of all babies born in certain regions. Through no fault of their own, but through the actions of the parents, they are born with a condition that can, and usually does, last a lifetime with both physical and mental ramifications. These babies are victims from birth. I ask for your support in making this our #1 priority. Let's work to prevent another baby from being born-drug addicted. Our future and existence depends on it and it cannot happen without you.

HCD offers programs to help tribal members attain homeownership

ousing and Community Development's (HCD) Housing Services Program offers several programs directed toward assisting EBCI tribal members attain homeownership. Through a concerted effort with lenders Wells Fargo and First Citizens and HCD's own Portfolio Program and other lending programs, HCD is able to offer housing opportunities to many whom never thought homeownership was possible.

HCD's Housing Services utilizes the following programs:

• Down Payment Assistance Program – HCD will assist enrolled members with obtaining down payment assistance of 20 percent of the

sales contract price up to \$30,000 when an applicant receives a loan prequalification from Wells Fargo, First Citizens or another lending institution. Down Payment Assistance is only available to purchases or construction on trust lands.

• Rehabilitation Loans – Loans are available to eligible applicants to renovate and/or rehabilitate their existing homes. Maximum loan amount is \$25,000 for enrolled members who own their own homes; HCD will take a second lien position on homes that are still under contract with a lending institution and \$7,500 for members with an existing agreement with Qualla Housing Authority. Applicants must meet es-

tablished criteria for approval.

- **Portfolio Loan** This program enables potential homebuyers with less than good credit to attain a mortgage loan through tribal funds. Applicants must demonstrate a willingness to repair their credit and meet certain financial thresholds to gain loan approval.
- Rate Buy Down HCD will assist approved mortgagees with funds necessary to reduce higher interest rates offered by their lending institution. This assistance is considered non payable.
- Land List Housing Services maintains a listing of interested individuals wishing to purchase HCD properties, individuals must not

have land in their own name or possess land which has been deemed "unbuildable" in order to be placed on this list. When a development is complete and ready for sale or as HCD properties become available, individuals will be contacted by their order on the Land List. To be placed on the Land List, interested enrolled members must complete a Land Inquiry form indicating their choice of community.

I'm Almost 65 — How Should I Prepare for Medicare?

Carolinians will turn 65 this year. Turning 65 is a lot like turning 16. When you turned 16, you didn't automatically get your driver's license; instead you had to take an exam and prove that you were a safe driver. There was a specific order and procedure for getting your driver's license, and the same is true for enrolling in Medicare for the first time when you turn 65.

Much like you anticipated turning 16 and getting your driver's license, you must anticipate and plan for becoming a Medicare beneficiary. Don't wait until you're 65 to start thinking about your Medicare choices. Start now and let SHIIP, the Seniors' Health Insurance Information Program, help you.

SHIIP, a division of the North Carolina Department of Insurance, provides free, unbiased information about Medicare and other insurance-related issues. There are SHIIP sites in all 100 counties in North Carolina. It is recommended that you contact SHIIP to review your Medicare options before you need to enroll so that you don't make any hurried decisions at the last minute. Your Medicare choices will depend on several factors, including: 1. Are you retired, or will you or your spouse continue to work?

- 2. Will you have access to medical and/or prescription drug coverage through an Employer Group Health Plan?
- 3. How does your Employer Group Health Plan compare with Medicare supplement plans and Medicare Advantage plans?

Of course there are other things to consider when determining your Medicare options. SHIIP has created a handout to help you navigate the Medicare system and initial enrollment process. The handout,

"The Road to Medicare," outlines the decisions you'll need to make and what options are available through the Medicare system. To obtain a free copy of "The Road to Medicare," call SHIIP at 1-800-443-9354 or visit SHIIP's website at www.ncshiip.com You can also meet with a certified SHIIP volunteer counselor in your community to discuss your Medicare options. To arrange an appointment with a SHIIP volunteer counselor, contact Denise Bradley 554-6183. Their office is located across from the Cherokee Cablevision in the Health Delivery or Administration Building

Don't wait to make your Medicare decisions — you can and should start the process before you turn 65. Let SHIIP help you understand your options and get you on the road to Medicare.

They support mothers with issues such as continuing school, finding work or establishing adequate housing.

Home visits start early in pregnancy and continues until the child's second birthday. The program also encourages participation from fathers and other members of the

ust beneath the surface of the dry and dusty Colorado desert soil. and beneath the rays of an intense summer sun, evidence exists that an ancient Indian civilization once thrived. A modern day Native American student, under the guidance of a skilled archaeologist, reaches out to touch a fragment of pottery made by a Pueblo Indian more than one thousand years ago.

Park plans mowing operation on Spur




