Opt-In Regional Summit held in Cherokee

fter 16 community workshops involving over 1,000 western North Carolina residents, Southwestern North Carolina's Opportunity Initiative – or Opt-In – came together to discuss the future of the region at the Opt-In Regional Summit held on Thursday, May 8 at Harrah's Cherokee Casino Hotel. Over 225 people attended the event.

"We had to make sure that the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians was successful for many reasons," said Principal Chief Michell Hicks in welcoming the Summit attendees, "for the children, for the elders, but to do that, we knew that we also had to make sure that the region was part of that success. And, we committed to that, and we're still committed to that."

Highway Administration, and the North Carolina Department of Transportation. It is overseen by the Southwestern Commission Council of Governments.

An 11-person Steering Committee helps drive Opt-In's mission of "Working together to better understand and inform choices facing local governments, businesses and families in North Carolina's seven westernmost counties, and in the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians."

Vice Chief Larry Blythe serves on that Steering Committee, and he spoke at Thursday's event. "When I was asked to participate in the Opt-In program on behalf of the Eastern Band, I immediately saw an opportunity. I felt through interactions with surrounding counties and communities as a member of the Opt-In team, I would be in a position to tell the Tribe's story and tell the story as it presently relates to our interest and involvement in

western North Carolina."

"The Tribe's story is not unlike our neighbors in the surrounding area of western North Carolina," he went on to say. "We know that everything – the region's economy, its infrastructure - begin and end with the mountains and river valleys, and they're the source of our advantages and they're the source of our challenges. And, one of the challenges is connectivity in terms of roads, bridges, internet,

etc., but also in terms of connecting community to community over these mountains and these hollers."

WCU chancellor David O. Belcher gave the keynote address and said that collaborations and partnerships are needed for the future of the region. "If we. in western North Carolina, are to be successful, we must partner with one another and form a general compact."

He praised the Opt-In

project and said it has "engaged the region's citizens repeatedly in various forums to identify priorities to chart the regional path forward".

Tribe to receive over \$4.8 million in federal grants

he Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians is set to receive over \$4.8 million in federal grants for highway repairs and economic development. Two Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) grants totaling \$4.7 million have been awarded for road repairs due to flooding in 2013. The rest of the funding is in the amount of \$145,000 from the Economic Development Association (EDA).

The highway funds will be used to repair numerous tribal roads that were damaged in the January 2013 flooding including: Towstring, Jenkins Creek, Dobson Ridge, Paul Owle, Sherrill Cove, Big Cove Loop, Smiley Littlejohn, Eugene Littlejohn, Bales Lane, Hicks Hollow, Becks Br., Lisa Parker Drive, Bunches Creek, Mount Noble, Lambert Branch, Old #4 (lower), Shut In Creek (Falls), Black Rock (lower), and Washingtons Creek.

The EDA grant will be used to develop a CEDS (comprehensive economic development strategy) for the five-county area including: Cherokee, Graham, Haywood, Jackson and Swain counties.

According to the EDA, "The CEDS process is designed to bring together the public and private sectors in the creation of an economic development roadmap to diversify and strengthen the regional economy."

Doug Cole, EBCI Planning Office, said their office was notified several weeks ago by Rep. Mark Meadows (R-NC) that the Tribe's three-year grant application had been approved. "The EBCI will receive \$145,000 in planning assistance over the 2014-16 time period to support the goals and objectives of the Tribe's current five-year CEDs which was developed and approved in 2012," said Cole. "The development and maintenance of an EDA-approved CEDs is a condition of receiving this grant. The EBCI has had a long-standing relationship with the EDA and has been the recipient of annual Parnership Planning Grants for many years."

Cole related that the EDA grant will be administered by the EBCI Planning Office which is in the EBCI Division of Commerce.



Hayesville students learn about Cherokee Culture

id you know
"yonah", as in
Yonah Mountain,
means bear in Cherokee?
EBCI tribal member Diamond Brown taught students Cherokee words
during his recent visit to
Hayesville. Diamond
Brown, or better know as
Go-Sti, which means Green
Leaf in Cherokee grew up
in the Snowbird Community of Graham County.

As a native educator and native culturist since 1992, Go-Sti travels all over the United States teaching and sharing his knowledge about the Cherokee culture. The Hayesville fourth and sixth graders benefited from that experience when Diamond spoke to them at the Clay County Schools amphitheater on Friday, May 2.

Brown, who was dressed in a style of clothing that would have been common after the Europeans arrived on this continent, described how Cherokee traditions were passed down from the elders and knowledge was learned orally. The Cherokee learned to respect all natural things, as they relied on nature for their

food, medicine, clothing, and shelter. Animals were killed to provide food and clothing for the hunter's family. Other parts of the animal would be used to make items needed for daily living. Horns might be fashioned into spoons, needles, or instruments. Antlers might become buttons or used as a hammer. Plants were used for food, shelter, clothing and medicine. It was important to take only some of the animals and plants at one time, because they would be needed in the future.

Brown clarified the correct drum beat rhythm the Cherokee and other native peoples use by comparing the native drumbeat to our own steady heart beats. It might be slow, medium or fast depending on the tempo of the singers and dancers.

He took the time to commend Hayesville and the Clay County Communities Revitalization Association (CCCRA) for their efforts to share the Cherokee culture. He highlighted the winter and summer houses at the Cherokee Homestead Exhibit as outstanding as they are authentic and accurate representations of Cherokee houses.

Horse owners urged to vaccinate animals against mosquito-borne diseases

ALEIGH – It's the beginning of mosquito season in North Carolina, which means it's also time for equine owners to talk to their veterinarians about vaccinating animals against mosquito-borne diseases.

West Nile Virus and Eastern
Equine Encephalomyelitis are endemic
across North Carolina and can cause
illness or death in equine, but can be
prevented with a sequence of two vaccines. Last year, there were two reported cases of WNV and 13 cases of
EEE, but veterinarians expect that the
actual number is higher.

"Now is the time to vaccinate against West Nile Virus and EEE," state veterinarian David Marshall said. "Mosquito breeding peaks in August, so starting the vaccination protocol now gives it time to take effect."

The EEE and WNV vaccinations initially require two shots, three to four weeks apart, for horses, mules and donkeys that have no prior vaccination history. Neither vaccination fully protects the animal until several weeks after the second shot, so it is best to vaccinate as early in the mosquito season as possible. Marshall encourages horse owners to talk to their veterinarians about maintaining the vaccination year-round in North Carolina, since the mosquito season is long.

"In addition to getting animals vaccinated, everyone needs to be extra vigilant now to reduce the breeding grounds for mosquitoes," Marshall said. "Take the time now to rid your yard and pasture of any standing water to reduce the risk."

Symptoms of EEE in equine include impaired vision, aimless wandering, head pressing, circling, inability to swallow, irregular staggering gait, paralysis, convulsions and death.

Symptoms of WNV in horses can include loss of appetite and depression, fever, weakness or paralysis of hind limbs, convulsions, impaired vision or hyperexcitability.

People, horses and birds can become infected from a mosquito carrying the diseases, but there is no evidence that horses can transmit the virus to other horses, birds or people through direct contact.

The TEFAP Distribution for this quarter will be held, Thursday, May 29, 2014, from

9:00-11:45 and 1:00-3:45. This distribution will be held at the Commodity Building on Old Mission Road. Foods will be served on a first come first serve basis. This TEFAP distribution is ONLY for residents of the Qualla Boundary. If you do not reside on the Qualla Boundary but live in Jackson or Swain counties, you should seek assistance from the Department of Social Services in those counties. The TEFAP guidelines are different from the regular commodity program in this manor. The regular commodity program allows you to live off the Qualla Boundary in Jackson and Swain counties and still get assistance if you have an enrolled member residing in your household and meet the other guidelines, this program you must live on the Qualla Boundary.

Guidelines for the TEFAP program remain the same as in the past. If you receive assistance from Food Stamps or Commodities you are eligible to receive the TEFAP foods. If you do not receive Food Stamps or Commodities and meet the income guidelines at the bottom of the page you will also be eligible. Any questions please call 497 - 9751.

People wishing to apply for the food products MUST come prepared to provide the following information:

- Name and physical address of household
- Total number of household members
- Total household monthly gross income, if not receiving Food Stamps or Commodity Foods
- VERY IMPORTANT: If the head of household is not present when the application is made, a note from them must be presented giving you permission to apply on their behalf. If a spouse is considered head of household on Food Stamps and the other spouse or another person living in the household is applying then the head of household on the Food Stamp case must send a note giving that person permission to pick up their food.
- Authorized Representatives may only pick up for two households. They may pick up for themselves and one other household or they may pick up for two households and not themselves.

Available items for this distribution are: Canned Pork, Canned Salmon, Blackeyed Peas, Peanut Butter, Macaroni, Rice Cereal, Orange Juice, Canned Chicken, Raisins and Frozen Blueberries. These items are served on first come first basis.
