Groundbreaking held for new MRI room at Hospital

Thanks to a huge donation from Caesar's Entertainment, Inc., a new MRI room will be open at Cherokee Indian Hospital early in 2013. A groundbreaking was held at the site on Wednesday, Oct. 24 as well as a \$2 million check presentation that will fund the machine in its entirety and the operation for five years.

"Rarely does a rural, small hospital have such a project and we owe it to the leadership of our Tribal Council and our Chief and also the executives at Harrah's casino for negotiating and providing us with this wonderful gift," said Carmaleta Monteith, Cherokee Indian Hospital Authority board. "We will be able to provide very valuable services and shorten the period of time for consultation and analyses."

Casey Cooper, Cherokee Indian Hospital CEO, related that he hopes to have a ribbon cutting sometime in February to officially open the new facility.

"In my opinion, as the CEO, this type of technology in a small, rural hospital of our size is really uncommon," said Cooper. "And, it clearly would not be possible without the partnership that we have with the Eastern Band and without the hard work of the casino staff and the casino employees. We are extremely grateful to be a beneficiary of their hard work."

He said the benefits of having a MRI machine on site are tremendous. "It's going to help us shorten that time when patients are stressed and they have anxiety because they haven't received a diagnosis."

Cooper said it will cut out the days or even weeks it sometimes takes now for patients to be sent elsewhere for a MRI. "It's going to help us with the diagnosis of malignant neoplasms or cancers. It's going to

help us with muscle and skeletal injuries and joint disorders. It's going to help in a tremendous amount of wavs."

Principal Chief Michell Hicks commented, "This Tribe is blessed and technology has brought us a long way."

"The whole vision was to bring something that would be a benefit for our people."

Chief Hicks told the crowd that earlier in the day he signed legislation that will provide for a new hospital to be built on a site adjacent to the current facility. "We will provide better services than we ever have in the past and this new technology will help us do that. We will continue to grow and we have to grow

smart. I want to thank the casino for all of the resources. We couldn't do it without vou."

He said the MRI and the new hospital is an investment. "It's investing in the future and it's investing in our people. And, that's what we do."

Brooks Robinson, Harrah's Cherokee senior vice president and general manager, commented, "This is a great opportunity for me to really thank the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians for the partnership that we've had the last 15 years."

He said that Caesar's has a commitment to giving back and being a part of the communities they are involved in. "To date, we've had over \$4 million in donations to the surrounding communities. We've added jobs. About 60 percent of our upper management at the property are tribally-enrolled members. That's something that we're very proud of."

Robinson continued, "We're proud to be a part of this."

According to WebMD, MRI is defined as, "Magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) is a test that uses a magnetic field and pulses of radio wave energy to make pictures of organs and structures inside the body. In many cases, MRI gives different information about structures in the body than can be seen with an x-ray ultrasound, or computed tomography (CT) scan."



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2nd Annual Cherokee Heritage Festival held in Hayesville

HAYESVILLE - Clay County Communities Revitalizations Association's (CCCRA) second annual Cherokee Heritage Festival was enjoyed by approximately 450 visitors on Saturday, October 20. The Cherokee Homestead Exhibit was alive with Eastern Band of Cherokee Indian (EBCI) demonstrations of Cherokee crafts, dancing, and stickball.

Smoke from a small fire filled the air as Joel Queen fired recently built pots. The aroma of Cherokee frybread tempted the appetites of many attending the festival.

EBCI artisans Ramona Lossie and Emma Garrett wove rivercane baskets, Karen George and Lori Reed demonstrated fingerweaving, Joel Queen displayed flint knapping, Jack Wachacha brought handmade blowguns, James Wolf displayed his recently made stone carvings, and Kevin George demonstrated flint knapping when he wasn't singing for the dancers.

Presenters included T.J. Holland who spoke about Hiwassee Valley River town settlements. Lamar Marshall answered questions about Cherokee trading trails and Don Wells talked about trail trees, described in his recently published book, Mystery of the Trees. Clay County resident Darry Wood captivated visitors with demonstrations of flint knapping, fire building, dart making and blow gun.

Funding for the festival was provided by the Blue Ridge National Heritage Area (BRNHA) and the Mary Duke Biddle Foundation. The Junaluska Museum and the Little Tennessee Land Trust (LTLT) sponsored T.J. Holland and Lamar Marshall is associated with Wild South. Clay County Historical & Arts Council's volunteers were on hand to wel-

come the numerous visitors to the museum, many for the first time. Don Wells donated a percentage of his book sales to CCCRA. Blankenship Seed Company provided hay bales and C&H Services provided port-o-lets for the event.

The recently completed multiuse summer structure, funded by the Creating New Economies Fund (CNEF), and landscaping at the Cherokee Homestead Exhibit made it the ideal site for an event which celebrated the heritage of the Cherokee.

Angie Chandler, of the BRNHA, attended the festival and expressed delight in the success of the event and the appearance of the Cherokee Homestead Exhibit. She commented on the likelihood of the exhibit becoming an attractor for visitors to our area, particularly those inter-

ested in history and the Cherokee culture.

The Cherokee Homestead Exhibit is a reconstructed 17th – 18th century homestead featuring a winter house, summer house, food storage crib, multi-use structure, Cherokee garden, and information kiosks. Public art includes handforged steel representations of Cherokee clan masks and iconic symbols of Cherokee culture and mythology, and wall-mounted panels depicting Cherokee artifacts, art and symbols. ROBBINSVILLE - The Robbinsville Black Knights scored 28 second half points to top the Cherokee Braves 35-14 on Friday, Oct. 26. EBCI tribal members Spencer McCoy and Cruz Galaviz led the Black Knights.

McCoy scored on runs of 1yd and 4yds and Galaviz gained 110 yards on 18 carries.

Cherokee's Logan Woodard scored the only points for the Braves as he returned an interception 47 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter and ran 75 yards for another score in the third quarter.

On the night, Woodard gained 103 yards on 19 carries.

The Braves gained 197 yards on the ground and 54 in the air for 251 total yards of offense. Robbinsville had 259 on the ground and 100 in the air for a total of 359.

Each team had two turnovers. Cherokee travels to Murphy on Friday, Nov. 2 at 7:30pm for the first round of the NC 1A state playoffs.

Toineeta, who qualified for the state meet last year as a freshman, placed 13th in the girls regional with a time of 22:20.04. Sophia Bhalla, Lincoln Charter, won the regional championship with a time of 19:48.19. She was followed by Sarah Hardin, Lake Norman Charter, 20:47.85 and Mara Bhalla, Lincoln Charter, 20:55.82.

Lincoln Charter edged out Lake Norman for the regional team championship. Both schools posted a score of 39, but Lincoln Charter won the championship by having a better total time. Swain County took third with a score of 101 followed by Hayesville 112, Hendersonville 126, Pine Lake Prep. 144, Highland School of Technology 171 and Thomas Jefferson 191.

Mahan took 9th in the boys race with a time of 18:03.51. Dylan Johnson, SMC champion from Hayesville, won the regional championship with a time of 16:24.59. He was followed by Zach Boone, Mitchell, 16:33.00 and Frank Cline, Robbinsville, 17:05.21.

Lake Norman won the boys regional team championship with a score of 41. They were followed by Mitchell 79, Hayesville 120, Highland School of Technology 130, Pine Lake Prep. 156, Hendersonville 168, Murphy 174, Robbinsville 226, Thomas Jefferson 237, Swain County 254, Cherokee 275, Lincoln Charter 286 and Highlands 312.

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





What is Encephalitis? Encephalitis is inflammation (swelling and irritation) of the brain, usually caused by infection. In some cases encephalitis can let to severe rauma and life threatening conditions.

What are the Symptoms? When Encephalitis happens after a common illness ike chickenpox, the signs and symptoms of that illness come before and inflammation in the brain. Symptoms such as high fever, severe headaches, sensitivity to light (called photophobia: light hurts your eyes) Nausea, vomiting, stiff neck, confusion, drowsiness, irritability or poor temper control.

Where does Encephalitis come from? Encephalitis comes from infected mosquitoes which are called Tree-Hole mosquitoes. Tree Hole mosquitoes lay there larva eggs in any object that holds water such as buckets, gutters, ponds, old tires, trash and any object that may hold standing water. Once the eggs are laid, it takes only 5 whole days for the larva to hatch. It is very important to empty any object that holds standing water especially after a good rain.

How do I protect myself? Protecting yourself from Tree Hole Mosquitoes is very important. One good way is to apply bug-repellant that contains "DEET" to any open bare-skin each time a person is outside. Apply bug-repellant as followed by directions. Another way to protect yourself by wearing long sleeves and pants during outdoor activities.




