# Crowning moments

2024-25 EBCI Royalty crowned at 112th Annual Cherokee Indian Fair

HEROKEE, N.C.—During the 112th Annual Cherokee Indian Fair, the Little Miss Cherokee and Junior Miss Cherokee pageants were held on the evening of Wednesday, Oct. 2, the Teen Miss Cherokee and Miss Cherokee pageants were held on the evening of Thursday, Oct. 3, and for the first time in 20 years, the Senior Miss Cherokee pageant was held on the afternoon of Oct.

Faith "Alitami" Panther was

#### INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAM SERVICES ON TRUST LANDS

**Site Inspection:** This process begins at Tribal Realty and is sent through the approval process to identify a buildable house site and road access.

House Lot Survey: Surveying requests for approved buildable house sites.

Site Prep: House site grading and driveway will be constructed on a buildable house site.

**Hydroseeding:** To help prevent erosion, hydroseeding will be done once site prep is complete.

**Block Foundation:** The foundation will be built for modular homes and stick built homes.

**Termite Spray:** This treatment is for block foundations for new homes.

**Concrete Footers:** Footers will be poured for single and doublewide mobile homes.

Block Underpinning: Block underpinning will be installed for doublewides.

Vinyl Underpinning: K-rock vinyl underpinning will be installed on single wide trailers.

**Trailer Transports:** Mobile home transports from trust land locations to be set up as permanent residence for enrolled members. We do not transport mobile homes from a mobile home company due the warranty on the home and liability.

**Gutters:** Gutter install is provided for new homes if needed, such as modulars, stick built and doublewides. We do not install gutters on singlewides. Gutter repair is done if they are causing erosion problems.

**Final Grade:** Drain lines are installed and the yard is graded to give positive drainage away from the foundation along with seed and straw to prevent erosion.

**Asbestos Assessment:** This assessment is performed on any home on trust lands owned by EBCI members and is being fully remodeled or demoed for replacement of a new home as the permanent residence.

**Asbestos Abatement:** The abatement is performed on any home that is positive for asbestos. The analysis is sent to Environmental, TCP and to the Land Fill for EBCI members replacing the old home with a new home as their permanent residence.



crowned Little Miss Cherokee.
Misha "Losi" Slee was crowned
Junior Miss Cherokee. Dvdaya
Swimmer was crowned Teen
Miss Cherokee. Moira George
was crowned Miss Cherokee, and
Kim Sneed Lambert was crowned
Senior Miss Cherokee.

The Little Miss Cherokee pageant featured four contestants: Penelope Stamper, Mattie Awee Moore, Jaxtyn Bark, and Faith Panther. Stamper was named first runner-up after two sudden death tiebreakers between Stamper and Panther that included naming the seven clans of the Cherokee, which both contestants completed successfully, and then answering who they look up to as a role model. Stamper answered Kyla Moore, who was on the 2023-24 Lady Braves 1A State Championship basketball team whom Stamper manages. Panther answered her mother, Frances Oocumma. Jaxtyn Bark was named second runner-up and Most Photogenic. Stamper and Moore both received Miss Congeniality.

2024-25 Little Miss Cherokee Faith Panther, from Tsisqwohi (Birdtown), is the daughter of Frances and Frank Oocumma. She is in the third grade at New Kituwah Academy. Panther sported her soccer uniform for her outfit of choice, "I'm wearing my soccer uniform because it's fun and it keeps me active. I'm wearing my goalie uniform because it's my favorite position."

Panther won hearts with her talent, where she dressed in a sweater and glasses imitating her great grandmother, the late Kina Littlejohn. Panther taught the crowd Cherokee words with help from her brother, Jamy Oocumma, who held giant flash cards as "Granny Kina" used to in her classroom. Pageant host Jayson Crusenberry polled the audience to see who had learned Cherokee language as a child from Granny Kina. Hands shot up throughout the crowd.

For traditional wear, Panther modeled 18th century traditional clothing, including a white linen trade shirt, a teal wrap skirt, a complementing coat, a black finger woven belt adorned with white beads, and pucker toe moccasins. There were three contestants in the Junior Miss pageant: Misha Slee, Khloe Sequoyah, and Keilani Arch. Along with winning Junior Miss Cherokee, Slee received Most Photogenic and Miss Congeniality. Sequoyah was named first runner-up. Arch was named second runner-up.

2024-25 Junior Miss Cherokee Misha "Losi" Slee, from Tsisqwohi (Birdtown), is the daughter of Rachel and Michael Slee. She is in the sixth grade at New Kituwah Academy.

Slee's outfit of choice was a ribbon skirt paired with a shirt featuring "Gatiyo," or Stomp.
Each color of her ribbon skirt held significance, including blue for her clan, which is the Blue Clan, and fire colors to represent fire, which Slee regards as "a vital part of Cherokee culture." Slee's skirt also featured Cherokee syllabary ribbon and ribbon with each of the seven clans of the Cherokee represented.

In the talent portion, Slee sang a Cherokee song from the album,

"Anvdvnelisgi." The song is by Lillian Charles, a Cherokee Nation citizen.

For traditional wear, Slee modeled 18th century traditional clothing, including a white linen trade shirt, a red wool wrap skirt and leggings worn by her mother, Rachel Slee, during her reign as Miss Cherokee, a black and red goose feather cape, and center-seam buckskin pucker toe moccasins.

There were three contestants in the Teen Miss pageant: Dvdaya Swimmer, Emma Maney, and Ayosta Lossie. Maney was named first runner-up and received Miss Congeniality and Most Photogenic. Lossie was named second runner-up.

2024-25 Teen Miss Cherokee Dvdaya Swimmer, from Aniwodihi (Painttown), is the daughter of Micah and Carrah Swimmer. She is a junior at Cherokee High School, where she competes in Lady Braves volleyball, basketball, cross country, and track and field. Swimmer was named Most Valuable Player in the 2023-24 1A State Basketball championship

game. She is also a state champion runner. She stated in her pageant introduction that she enjoys running, even when she is not competing.

Swimmer's public speaking platform was called, "Embracing the Power of Support." She shared her personal journey in embracing the support she receives, stating, "I had isolated my thinking to, 'It's me against the world,' but in reality, that's not healthy. I do have support from family, friends, community members, and even people across Native Country," Swimmer said.

"I began to think of those who do support me and wanted to prove them right instead of those who don't support me wrong." Swimmer referenced "ON THE SIDELINES: Family support is crucial for youth sports," written by Scott McKie Brings Plenty, assistant editor of the Cherokee One

Feather.

For the talent portion of the pageant, Swimmer sang a traditional prayer song, encouraging the audience to participate by thinking about a family member or friend who may need prayer. She shared the importance of prayer and the traditional practice of going to water in her life as an athlete and young Cherokee woman.

For traditional wear, Swimmer modeled 18th century women's traditional clothing, which included a white linen trade shirt, a red wool wrap skirt, side seam leggings, a white and red goose feather cape, and leather pucker toe moccasins.

Moira George was the sole contestant for the Miss Cherokee pageant. 2024-25 Miss Cherokee Moira George, from Kolanvyi (Big Cove), is the daughter of Leann Panther, and the granddaughter of Maddie Welch and the late

Snake Panther. She is a student in the Cherokee Language Master Apprentice Program (CLMAP). Cherokee language was centered throughout her performance in the pageant.

In the public speaking portion, George discussed the importance of learning Cherokee language, "Language is the foundation of everything. If we lose that, then we lose who we are."

In the talent portion, George discussed different types of Chero-kee baskets and their uses. Basket making is an art that has been passed down through five generations in George's family.

For traditional wear, George modeled 18th century women's traditional clothing, including a blue patterned linen trade shirt, a white feather cape, and a black wool wrap skirt with side seam leggings adorned with white beads

in the pattern of a spider web. The most intricate detail was a beaded spider weaving the beaded web. George explained her traditional wear entirely in Cherokee language.

There were four contestants vying for the title of Senior Miss Cherokee: Lou Jackson, Alyne Tooni, Kim Sneed Lambert, and Alyne Stamper. Stamper was named first runner-up. Jackson was named second runner-up. Tooni was named third runner-up as well as Most Photogenic and Miss Congeniality.

Judith Smith conferred the crown to Kim Sneed Lambert after holding the title for twenty years. Lambert was posed the question, "What would it mean to you to win Senior Miss Cherokee?" to which Lambert answered, "It would be the great honor of my life."



### **Justice is Restored Holding Perpetrators Accountable**

It is important to recognize that our relatives are struggling to heal from generations of trauma stemming from colonization, forced relocation, genocide, the abduction of children and babies carted off to more than 350 government-funded boarding schools and countless non-Native foster homes which caused irreparable harm to Native American and Alaska Native communities.

"When we call attention to Domestic Violence Awareness Month, we must not forget the path Tribal nations have been on for centuries," concluded Jump. "Until Native American history is told in truth and totality we must continue to tell our stories of triumph over trauma."







#### Reaching out

The holidays will be here soon, and not all of us will do well with getting through that time of the year. Whether it's the pressures of the social aspects of the season or financial worries or we're just not feelin' it, sometimes it's all just a bit much. But we're not alone.

The Department of Veterans Affairs has a website loaded with resources to help with all kinds of concerns. Go to www.va.gov/REACH/challenges and scroll down to view the categories, such as life transitions, health challenges, feelings of depression and many more. Select up to three statements that describe what you're going through (examples are "I don't care about the things I used to care about" and "I don't have anyone I can ask for help"), then click the "All Done" button at the bottom.

What you get is a page of resources tailor-made for you. Start working your way through all of them. The bottom line is that if you need support, the help is there. You're not alone. Sometimes the VA does things perfectly, and this website of resources is one of those.

On the flip side of the coin, perhaps you're doing extremely well and want to connect with fellow veterans who might need a bit of help. Buddy Check is a program that connects veterans. You'll take some short peer-to-peer training (a 34-minute video) and then pledge to reach out to 10 veterans. Although there is an official Buddy Check Week, there is no reason you can't reach out at other times of the year — especially now with the holidays coming up.

Check out Together We Served, a.k.a. the Buddy Finder (www.together weserved.com), to hunt for veterans you served with, and reconnect with them. At this writing, the site has over 2 million veterans who've registered their profiles to make contact with other veterans. Together We Served also has a Facebook page, as well as an app on Google Play and the App Store.

Make a winter training schedule for your pet

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: My German Shepherd, "Dante," is smart but stubborn, and constant training is essential. But I wanted to share a method I use to make sure I keep up with his basic obedience training and work on advanced skills year-round.

Every three to four months, I sit down with a new notebook and make a training journal for Dante. It helps me organize my thoughts around how to best train him in the late fall and winter, when going outside every day isn't always possible, or the weather is so unpleasant that Dante won't listen to my commands.

I write down the training goals I want to accomplish during this period. I note any behavioral or training issues that Dante has had up to now. Shepherds, like many big dogs and herders, have a lot of energy and need at least an hour per day of exercise, so I figure out the best times to do that. There are also a lot of holidays during this period, and the journal gives me a place to figure out in advance how I will handle travel, training, parties and other schedule challenges.

I hope my method will help other readers who are trying to maintain their dog's obedience skills while having a busy life. — Cheryl K. in Eau Claire, Wisconsin

DEAR Cheryl: That's fantastic advice! Thank you for sharing your journaling method. It sounds like it provides a space to write down much more information than jotting notes on a wall calendar.

Creating a training schedule and journal also is a big help in monitoring how well your dog is progressing with their training, and noting areas where improvements can be made.



## Moments in time

- On Oct. 21, 1861, Union troops suffered a crushing defeat at the Battle of Ball's Bluff in Virginia, the second major engagement of the Civil War, which produced the conflict's first martyr and led to the creation of a Congressional committee to monitor the conduct of the war.
- On **Oct. 22, 1797**, the first parachute jump of note was made by Andre-Jacques Garnerin from a hydrogen balloon 3,200 feet above Paris.
- On Oct. 23, 1998, Dr. Barnett Slepian was shot to death inside his home in Amherst, New York, by antiabortion radical James Charles Kopp. His killing marked the fifth straight year that an abortion-providing doctor in upstate New York and Canada became the victim of a sniper attack. Kopp, whose defense argued that he only intended to wound Slepian, was convicted of second-degree murder in 2003
- On Oct. 24, 1969, movie star Richard Burton dazzled his wife, actress Elizabeth Taylor, with a 69-carat Cartier diamond ring costing a cool \$1.5 million after she responded to his allegation that her hands were large and ugly by saying that he'd better buy her the ring to make them look smaller and more attractive. In 1979, the now-divorced Taylor put the ring up for auction and it sold for \$3 million.
- On Oct. 25, 1980, AC/DC earned their first pop Top 40 hit with "You Shook Me All Night Long." It remains their most popular single.
- On Oct. 26, 1921, President Warren G. Harding delivered a speech in Birmingham, Alabama, condemning lynchings, committed mainly by white supremacists against Black Americans in the Deep South and elsewhere. The previous year, the NAACP had reported that such crimes claimed, on average, the lives of two African Americans each week.
- On Oct. 27, 1659, William Robinson and Marmaduke Stevenson, two Quakers who'd emigrated from England in 1656 to escape religious persecution, were executed in the Massachusetts Bay Colony for their religious beliefs. The men had violated a law passed by the Massachusetts General Court the year before that banned Quakers from the colony under penalty of death.




