Kituwah pavilion construction underway

'ITUWAH - A groundbreaking ceremony was held for the Kituwah pavilion on the afternoon of Monday, March 3 including remarks from EBCI (Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians) Project Management Manager Rebecca Bowe, Ugvwiyuhi (Principal Chief) Michell Hicks, Taline Ugvwiyu (Vice Chief) Alan B. Ensley, EBCI Tribal Historic Preservation Office (THPO) Senior Archaeologist Brian Burgess, and Kituwah farmer Amy Walker, who spoke to the importance of



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

Kituwah and the necessity of the project for the community.

Bowe says the contractor for the project is expected to be on site beginning Monday, March 10, and the project is set to be completed by early May if not sooner.

The airplane hangar area at Kituwah has been used for several important community events such as the Annual Kituwah Celebration, the Remember the Removal Riders Send-off, and Cherokee Tri-Council meetings.

Ugvwiyuhi Hicks shared, "Today, we broke ground on an exciting new addition at Kituwah - a pavilion that will serve our community for years to come. Kituwah is the heart of our people, and this project reflects our commitment to preserving and enhancing this special space.

It is an investment in our future, ensuring that Kituwah re-

ward to seeing this project completed and the many ways it will benefit our people."


Bowe provided a basic render-

Continuing to grow

Great Smoky Cannabis Co. expanding

HEROKEE, N.C. – On an overcast and chilly late winter morning, Simon Montelongo works in a room, clean as a laboratory, with fellow employees processing

cannabis in various products. Montelongo, a lead processor at the Great Smoky Cannabis Co. farm, is one of over 225 employees with the company which continues to grow and expand.

The Great Smoky Cannabis Co., located in Cherokee, N.C., opened to the general public for sales of adult-use cannabis on Sept. 7, 2024. The dispensary is operated by Qualla Enterprises, LLC, an entity of the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians (EBCI), which also operates a cannabis farm in Tsisqwohi (Birdtown) which supplies the dispensary.

The Sept. 7 event was the third and final stage of opening for the dispensary. Sales of adult-use cannabis for EBCI tribal members as well as members of other federally recognized tribes opened on July 4, 2024, and medical cannabis sales opened on April 20, 2024. Numerous cannabis products are sold at the dispensary from edibles to vapes to plant flowers.

Montelongo, an EBCI tribal member, leads a crew that works on producing some of these products. "With the guidance that I had, I was able to learn homogenizing the terps, glass and plastic hardware, and how we're doing it to the standard of cleanliness. The standard of how our Cannabis Control Board wants the products produced. Everything that I've been trained on, I've seen it was able to be recipro-

cated to my entire team.

To say that I've only been here for a month and I can operate most of this is a testament to the training."

Like his fellow employees, Montelongo is proud to be working at a business that now represents a little more than 90 percent of EBCI tribal families.

"I actually feel like I'm working towards the investment of our tribe and our future. This is something that I want to see thriving in the next 25 years so well that it employs the majority of our enrolled members. It's been an outlet that I've seen a lot of people in recovery come find their safe refuge of work. Some people love this job so much they don't see themselves working anywhere else. I see myself, as a community member, working here as a big part of this big, awesome machine."

He added, "I feel like I'm an integral piece of what is being produced here every day and that my community gets to see it, tourists get to see it, everyone from the surrounding states get to come through and try the products we're producing. It's awesome. It's amazing."

The company is expanding

– up from 93 employees when it
opened the dispensary for medical
cannabis on April 20, 2024, to
over 225.

Forrest Parker, Qualla Enterprises, LLC general manager and an EBCI tribal member, said, "Through belief in themselves and a sense of pride in helping their community provide medicine and revenue diversification, you've got a group of people that are hooked to a wagon that's extremely challenging. They're learning and they're growing and they're setting

this thing up for the future."

He is proud of the growth and said that it has come from determination from all of the employees. "Every week we push ourselves, we test ourselves. We go back to the drawing board and we are scheduled to go 7 days a week. Our target goal is by April to go 7 days a week. So, what we're currently doing is really pushing ourselves and pushing the limits of our production systems for back stocks of inventory so that we are getting higher levels of confidence in our ability to backfill during high-demand times. So that's really amazing."

The EBCI tribal government is not releasing any financial figures anymore. So, Parker was unable to provide actual numbers, but he did note, "As we go through this thing financially, we hope that everyone sees how much impact that has downstream by setting this company up in a way where it's operations and its margins out of the gate were on par with companies that were very established and very successful. That was done with Cherokee people, on Cherokee lands, for the benefit of the Eastern Band.'

He went on to say, "Our ability to supply innovative products at the highest level at the highest qualities dictates our success moving forward. That's why it's so critical that we reinvest into these systems and these infrastructure projects so that we can maximize this thing and leave no stone left unturned and capture as many customers as we possibly can right now so that we set the gold standard for what a regulated cannabis experience should feel like, so that you can make your own sovereign health choices with confidence.

And, you can trust the Eastern Band and Great Smoky Cannabis Company to do that."

Not only is the company expanding its workforce. It is also expanding its grow and production capabilities by adding a new 20,000 square foot indoor grow facility to the already 74 hoop houses operational on the farm site. Right now, the indoor facility is a building shell, but Parker plans to have it operational by June. Another hoop house based project has been designed and Qualla plans to break ground on this project early summer. This project would include supplemental lighting and expand the

extremely cost-effective model that has already been proven.

Parker is also proud that the company is doing this expansion on its own. "We are currently reinvesting revenue generated through our sales into our own capital expansion infrastructure projects. We're doing so with no assistance through bank loans."

The farm site is not just a farm – it's a fully-operational industry. "We have a lot of factory-level manufacturing elements in our business - assembly line, production technology, robotics, artificial intelligence...through technology we can empower people to be able to perform quickly, and efficiently,

and effectively, and have something they can learn, dive into, have confidence in, and create value for the company and themselves on day one. That's a big step in keeping the retention that we have, the extremely low turnover rate, and keeping everybody moving forward."

From the plants growing in the hoop houses to the floor of the dispensary, nothing is done by chance. Parker noted, "We're prioritizing and using the data and the information to drive our decision-making. We are agriculture, manufacturing, and retail. Nothing we're doing is guessing - there's science, there's sales data, there's demographics."

Cec Smith, an EBCI tribal member, works with the packaging for several of the products including vapes and prerolls. "I think it's neat because we have the Great Smoky brand which represents the company and this represents us as a people, the First Fire. I like it. It integrates the syllabary and the water spider."

The company is currently producing around 13,000 pre-rolls daily.

Isaiah Armachain, an EBCI tribal member, has worked at the farm for two years and enjoys being a part of a team. "I just wanted to be able to see the process of it and be able to know that I did it, I made it."

Parker said his employees are the company's greatest asset. "This is not just a business. It is a cultural movement. It's the progression of factual science in the real world and people getting access to safe, regulated medicine and it being ok. This is just a group of people that gets to take pride in helping provide that."

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INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAM SERVICES ON TRUST LANDS

Site Inspection: This process begins at Tribal Realty and is sent through the approval process to identify a buildable house site and road access.

House Lot Survey: Surveying requests for approved buildable house sites.

Site Prep: House site grading and driveway will be constructed on a buildable house site.

Hydroseeding: To help prevent erosion, hydroseeding will be done once site prep is complete.

Block Foundation: The foundation will be built for modular homes and stick built homes.

Termite Spray: This treatment is for block foundations for new homes.

Concrete Footers: Footers will be poured for single and doublewide mobile homes.

Block Underpinning: Block underpinning will be installed for doublewides.

Vinyl Underpinning: K-rock vinyl underpinning will be installed on single wide trailers.

Trailer Transports: Mobile home transports from trust land locations to be set up as permanent residence for enrolled members. We do not transport mobile homes from a mobile home company due the warranty on the home and liability.

Gutters: Gutter install is provided for new homes if needed, such as modulars, stick built and doublewides. We do not install gutters on singlewides. Gutter repair is done if they are causing erosion problems.

Final Grade: Drain lines are installed and the yard is graded to give positive drainage away from the foundation along with seed and straw to prevent erosion.

Asbestos Assessment: This assessment is performed on any home on trust lands owned by EBCI members and is being fully remodeled or demoed for replacement of a new home as the permanent residence.

Asbestos Abatement: The abatement is performed on any home that is positive for asbestos. The analysis is sent to Environmental, TCP and to the Land Fill for EBCI members replacing the old home with a new home as their permanent residence.

When looking at their success, analysts often talk about their speed, their defense, their shooting percentage, but there is another element to their success that is often overlooked:

They are good teammates.

He is right. Sharing the ball means trusting your teammates will take care of business, and on the other side of the pass, being ready when you get the ball.

The players expect excellence from each other. They motivate each other, they play for each oth-

er, and they celebrate each other.

I love watching the reaction from the bench when a player scores, or makes a good pass, or gets a block or a steal. They smile bigger for their teammates' success than they do for their own. That's rare, and we could learn from that. Being "selfless" is the foundation of their success. Basketball is a team sport, and they play as a team. You hear that a lot, "there's no 'I' in team," but you don't see it often.

Think about it. These are young Cherokee girls. They are the youth of our tribe, and they are giving us the example of the selflessness that we should strive for as a community. Jr. (#4) Dv-daya Swimmer currently holds the title of Teen Miss Cherokee, as she should.

Because they are gadugi. Being a good community member is just that: being a good teammate.

CHEROKEE, N.C. - March is Women's History Month. For the month of March, the One Feather will be sharing articles that highlight strong, intelligent women behind the day-to-day operations of the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians (EBCI).

Kamiyo Lanning, manager of Cherokee Recreation, and Janell Rattler, senior games coordinator for Cherokee Recreation, are preparing for a busy season of Spring sports.

The Qualla Boundary Senior Games held their opening ceremony on Tuesday, March 4 at the Peaches Squirrell Sports & Recreation Complex in Tsisqwohi (Birdtown), and Cherokee Youth Wrestling kicked off on Feb. 24 in the Donald "Koolaid" Queen Gym & Recreation Center in Wayohi (Wolftown).

Lanning and Rattler, both members of the EBCI, say every day is different at Cherokee Recreation, but that's part of the fun. "My day-to-day duties could be anything. I just registered a senior games participant. I've got staff that are down at the bowling alley

right now with our Special Olympics athletes. I've got two other staff that are down at the senior center in Snowbird doing registration. I walked the playground yesterday. My day-to-day could be anything that deals with any

one of our facilities, and I oversee all six of our recreation facilities including the skate park, John Crowe Complex, and the EMS playground," Lanning said.

Rattler works closely with Cherokee women who are elders in the Senior Games, which she says is rewarding, "When you work with the elders, it's keeping them active, keeping their mind active. Our Native women are really competitive, and each of my seniors always aspire to bring home as many medals as they can. It's a good feeling knowing we can help provide that."

Rattler said it's also rewarding to see each athlete's growth at Cherokee Recreation, from youth league sports to the Senior Games. "No matter how young or old they are, from the beginning to the end is what is amazing because for a child or a senior, if they've never done that sport and they are willing to advance and branch out and learn something new, it's just amazing what they learn and grasp, and in the next year, you'll really see the difference."

Lanning said providing sports and recreation for women and girls is an important part of her service to the community. "I think it's important because they see women in leadership in sports. They see they can move up and aspire to that, to being a part of a team, the basketball teams, the volleyball teams, and being a part of the team environment allows you to grow," she said.

"This is service. You don't get into a service job without wanting to give back to the community, and I think we do that through every facet."

The Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians Exclusion List

The Tribe hereby declares that the power to exclude is an inherent and essential part of Tribal sovereignty. It is indispensable to the Tribe's autonomy and self-governance. Further, it is a natural right of the members of this Tribe, through their Tribal leaders and codified Tribal law, to exercise the power of exclusion to protect the Tribal source, and cultural resources, and to protect the health, safety and welfare of Tribal members (Cherokee Code C 2.1.e). Anyone banished by the EBCI is excluded from all Tribal lands and must vacate all tribal lands. If an excluded person is found improperly on Tribal lands will be treated as a trespasser and appropriate legal action shall be taken against them.

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



Beloved Woman is a fierce language warrior

CHEROKEE, N.C. – I take a lot of photographs, but one of my favorites from the past few years shows an elder of the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians (EBCI) at the Annual Cherokee Speakers Walk. Myrtle Driver Johnson, EBCI Beloved Woman, is the subject of that photo, and she is shown truly happy at being around so many EBCI tribal members learning and speaking the Cherokee language.

She is always encouraging people to learn and use the Cherokee language. At that Annual Cherokee Speakers Walk in 2023, she told the crowd gathered, "Thank you to everyone that came out to support the Cherokee speakers. What a beautiful sight to see all these green shirts (worn by Cherokee language speakers and second language learners). They're learning to speak the most beautiful language in the world."

Beloved Woman Johnson serves as a translator for Dinilawigi (Tribal Council) – a service to the EBCI she has provided for years.

In addition to translating numerous documents, words, and school lessons, she has translated two books into the Cherokee language including "Thirteen Moons" by Charles Frazier and the children's classic "Charlotte's Web" by E.B. White.

In 2016, I interviewed her about her translation of "Charlotte's Web", and she said working on the book was an intensive process, "Every time I would work on it, I would just immerse myself into the farm and into the community

where Charlotte lived. And, when she died, I cried."

She said that translating the book into the Cherokee language required some changes. "You can't translate word for word. If you translate it word for word, it wouldn't make sense because you have to describe so many of the English words. It's impossible to translate word for word."

This process took Beloved Woman Johnson back to a time in her life when Cherokee was spoken more often. "There were times when I'd come across a word and I'd have to go outside and walk around for about an hour and then it would come to me. I tried to use as many of the old words that we just don't use in everyday conversation."

Beloved Woman Johnson

received the Distinguished Citizen Award from the Junaluska Leadership Council in 2014.

For her, it is always about the language – always about the work, never about herself.

At the groundbreaking for the Cherokee Speakers Place (kalvgviditsa tsalagi aniwonisgi tsunatsohisdihi), located adjacent to the New Kituwah Academy in Cherokee, N.C., she spoke to being able to do that work. "I think about the teachers who had no place to work to generate materials for the children to use. But now, we will have our own building. Lord willing I'm still here. But we will now finally have our own building. The buildings I think of where materials were generated were the women's shelter, the TOP building, Ginger Lynn, the Academy, and of course,

the speakers building above there. Tribal Council, Chief, and Vice Chief, to me this is a dream come true. To have one place where we can develop these materials."

I would be remiss if I didn't mention one of her strong points – her incredible sense of humor.

During a discussion on the Beloved Women Committee in Dinilawigi in 2023, she spoke to the Cherokee Seven Core Values and noted, "The one I like the most is the one that I will use, and that is to find humor in things that upset you."

Beloved Woman Johnson truly is a fierce warrior for the Cherokee language, culture, and traditions, and she does it all with a smile and a sense of humor.

SPEAKING OF FAITH

Dog Bones

Scripture References: John 8:36, Romans 8:1, Titus 3:3,Romans 8:6, Phil. 4:7, John 10:9-11, John 14:27

Each Wednesday morning, an eclectic group of men meets for prayer, devotion, breakfast, and fellowship. Our mix of devotees have been or currently are preachers, teachers, deacons, or church leaders. From that mix, we include those who are also military veterans, Christian motorcyclists, computer programmers, musicians, realtors, chemical engineers, newspaper editors, and combinations of those. This group of men's ages varies from the thirty-somethings to the eighty-year-olds, but each one adds to the collection of stories and experiences that are rich with the flavor of living full Christian lives. The background of this message comes from a Wednesday devotion of one of these men. Marty is a retired Marine from the Vietnam era who did his share of fighting while flying helicopters in battle. He is currently (at the time of this writing) the President of the Western North Carolina Chapter of the Christian Motorcycle Association (CMA) and a former pastor of a local Baptist church.

One day while sitting in our local Veteran's Administration hospital waiting room, Marty overheard a conversation between two other veterans sitting behind him. One of the veterans was a younger man who had served in combat in Afghanistan and Iraq. The other was an older man who had served in combat in Vietnam. They began cordially talking about the weather and the hospital service they received, and then the younger man began to relate war stories that were haunting him for the things he had seen and done. The older man tried to interject his experience, but the young man wouldn't let him get a word in edgewise. Finally, the old man said, "Let me tell you about a dog I used to have." The young man's attention was taken, as ours was, trying to relate what this guy's dog had to do anything with the younger man's experiences. The older soldier told a story about how he had a big dog whom he rewarded with a meaty bone from the butcher shop. The dog chewed on the bone for a time, then buried it. After a few days, he dug up the bone, chewed it, reburied it, and left it a few more days. The dog dug up the bone again a week later, now very rancid. He chewed on it again, but this time he seemed happy to bury it again for the last time. Everyone got the message except, apparently, the young man.

Did you get the message from that story? Those of us who have lived any length of time have a bad memory in our past that we dig up and chew on. The older it gets, the more that specific sinful past or offense pricks our consciousness. It is best to bury it and forget about it. But some people can't do that, and it destroys them; for others, it is just a bad memory that returns in nightmares for years afterward.

As Christians, we have a Savior who died for our sins and freed us from the chains of guilt and condemnation. Whenever we (or Satan) dig up that nasty bone again, we have a bar of soap that cleans that memory out of our minds and gives us a peace only God can give. It may take years of therapy for non-Christians to forgive and forget; if they live that long. I could share how thousands of war veterans have committed suicide, unable to purge the memory of things they've done, seen, or had done to them. But it is not just war victims who suffer these burdens from evil memories

and how they can destroy lives. What everyone needs is Jesus. He is the balm that soothes the pain of guilt, condemnation, and unforgiveness. His sacrifice on the cross paid for all those sins. He is the one whose grace covers the pain, guilt, and shame Satan holds over us. Others need to hear that. I pray for the young war victim in this story to find Christ and heal his burden.

As we witness to the lost and those we meet, our past is a tool to effectively remind others that we all have a sin sickness that only the Holy Spirit of God can heal. Everyone has sinned, and when reminded of it, many seek salvation. No one is getting to Heaven with sin on their ledger. As Christians, we know the One who cleans the slate. Lead others to Christ. Jesus saves.

Lord God and Father, we praise Your Holy Name above all. Remind us each day that You are good and Your gifts come in many packages. Thank You for allowing us to love and forgive ourselves because You love and have forgiven us. Lord, we pray that others will find Your love, forgiveness, and peace in You. Please help us to show others where they will find salvation from the evil that troubles their minds. Help us to show others where they can find the renewing of their minds through Christ. Amen.





The VA in the news

So much is going on right now. With the new administration making many changes on a daily basis across the federal government, some of those changes were sure to affect the Department of Veterans Affairs. Here is one thing that has happened: The VA let go 1,000 employees.

For the most part they were probationary employees (deemed nonmission critical) with less than one year on the job or those in another employment category who had worked for less than two years.

This 1,000 is out of the 43,000 probationary employees they didn't fire because they were mission critical and out of a total of 473,000 employees at the VA. One year ago the VA had planned to reduce their numbers by 10,000 employees in 2025. Then there are the many thousands who took the deferred resignation offer, which will allow them to stay home and still be paid through September. So the 1,000 fewer employees isn't a massive number.

The financial bottom line from this recent move is that \$98 million was saved, money that will be plowed back into services and benefits for veterans, per Secretary Doug Collins.

While this move was effective immediately, there is a catch: Management can ask that certain employees not be terminated to ensure that the work can go on, that benefits and services aren't effected.

Rumor has it that some of the employees who were let go had handled the phones at the suicide crisis line. A senator stepped in and asked that two of the employees be reinstated.

While it might be a bit unnerving to see cuts at the VA for the benefits and services we depend on, I say we should just wait it out and not let panic set in. We have a new VA secretary, and for now we should trust him to fight for what's right for us, despite all the loud naysayers who excel at stirring up anxiety. I think it will all be OK.

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Are big dogs passe? Smaller, indoor dogs gain popularity

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: Why are so many people opting for small, yappy dogs these days instead of big dogs? That seems to be all I see when folks walk their dogs around here. A small dog won't protect you or your home. — Bobby T., Oak Ridge, Tennessee

DEAR BOBBY: While it may seem that most dog owners are choosing smaller breeds, the number of small vs. large dogs varies greatly depending on where you live. So you may observe that most of your immediate neighbors have small dogs — but their popularity is not as universal as you think.

The American Kennel Club, for example, annually lists the most popular dogs by number of registrations per breed. In 2023, the most recent year of published data, the French bulldog was the most popular registered breed in the U.S. However, among the top 10 breeds, only four — including the French bulldog, Dachshund, Beagle and Bulldog — could be classified as "small." The remaining six most popular dogs, including the Rottweiler, Golden Retriever and German Shorthaired Pointer, are all large breeds.

Not all U.S. households that own dogs have registered breeds, of course, The American Veterinary Medical Association in 2024 reported that just under half of U.S. households own dogs, while 32.1% are cat owners. So, while the French bulldog may be the most popular AKC-registered pet, that statistic doesn't take into account all of the dogs that are being walked through their neighborhoods nationwide.

Security-wise, having a dog of any size can be a deterrent for potential intruders (or attackers). Large breeds, often gentle giants, can deter people with bad intentions easily, but smaller breeds should not be underestimated.



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Moments in time

- On March 24, 1965, the first "teach-in" was conducted at the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor, in which 200 faculty members led special anti-war seminars while regular classes were canceled and rallies and speeches held sway for 12 hours.
- On March 25, 2001, Icelandic actress and pop singer Bjork made an unforgettable appearance at the 73rd annual Academy Awards in a nude body stocking draped with a large, fake white swan. As if that weren't enough, the artist then proceeded to "lay" six giant ostrich eggs. Whatever popular opinion said about the look, the dress went on to be honored by the Museum of Modern Art and The Metropolitan Museum of Art.
- On March 26, 1804, President Thomas Jefferson attended a public party at the Senate and led a diverse crowd in eating an enormous loaf of bread dubbed the "mammoth loaf." The bread had been baked to go with the remnants of a giant block of cheese.




